

PRESIDENT BUSH THURSDAY, 12 APRIL TO SATURDAY 14 APRIL 1990

DAY 1 - THURSDAY 12 APRIL

- 1. By 11.40 a.m. a Guard of Honour of 50 rank and file found by the Bermuda Regiment, under the Command of Captain Edward Tucker, with the Band of the Regiment will be in position on the airport apron, having entered by the Queen's Gate. Arrangements will have been made for the spectators enclosure to be available for members of the public who wish to watch. The Band will play until the aircraft approaches.
- 2. By 11.45 a.m. the following will be present at the airport having entered by the Queen's Gate and parked cars under police direction. They will subsequently be ushered into position by the Protocol Officer.

The Minister of Delegated and Legislative Affairs and Lady Sharpe The Minister of Transport and Mrs. Marshall The Secretary to the Cabinet and Mrs. Richardson The Commissioner of Police and Mrs. Donald The Director of Civil Aviation & Mrs. Pitman The Commanding Officer, The Bermuda Regiment

- 3. At 11.47 a.m. the Premier, Sir John Swan and Lady Swan will arrive via the Queen's Gate and alight from their car where indicated by the Police. The Guard of Honour will be called to attention and the Guard Commander will salute.
- 4. At 11.50 a.m. His Excellency the Governor accompanied by Lady Langley and the ADC will arrive and will be received by a Royal Salute (6 bars). His Excellency will not inspect the Guard of Honour.
- 5. At 12 noon a VC10 of the Royal Air Force will arrive with the Prime Minister and Mr. Thatcher. Mrs. Thatcher will be accompanied by:

Ambassador Catto, United States Ambassador in London and Mr. Edness, Bermudian Minister of Health will also be on the aircraft. They will be met under arrangements made by the Consulate General and the Ministry of Health respectively.

- 6. The accompanying press party will leave the aircraft by the rear exit and take up position. The Governor will greet the Prime Minister and Mr. Thatcher and then introduce the Premier and Lady Swan and the remainder of the welcoming party. Lady Langley will introduce Mr. Thatcher.
- 7. The Commanding Officer will escort the Prime Minister to the saluting base and she will be received by a General Salute (Scipio). The Guard Commander will report to the Prime Minister and the Commanding Officer will invite her to inspect the Guard of Honour. At the conclusion of the inspection a bouquet of Easter Lilies will be presented to the Prime Minister by Miss Tourism (Miss Claire Jessey).
- 8. The Prime Minister will then drive by the North Shore to Government House (entering by the North Gate which will have been opened by 10.45 a.m.) escorted by the Bermuda Police, as follows:

PRIME MINISTER'S MEETING WITH PRESIDENT BUSH IN BERMUDA: KITE FLYING

Thank you for sending me a copy of Hamilton telegram no. 76 on the vexed question of Premier Swan's participation with the Prime Minister and President Bush in the kite flying at Government House. While it might have been better to keep this to the Prime Minister and the President to avoid any interruption to their talks, the Prime Minister does not want Premier Swan to feel excluded or unhappy. If the Governor could, without causing any awkwardness for himself, say that Premier Swan would be welcome to take part if he wishes to do so, the Prime Minister would be most grateful. It would need to be made clear to Premier Swan that the President and the Prime Minister will be returning immediately to their talks thereafter.

TRAVEL ON SPECIAL FLIGHTS

BAGGAGE AND INSURANCE REGULATIONS

1. BAGGAGE

- a) Those travelling by RAF aircraft are reminded that baggage should be left unlocked for the customary check. Butane gas lighter refills and matches, other than safety ones, may not be taken on the aircraft; certain aerosol sprays are now accepted on flights, provided they are not used on the aircraft. Any electrical items must be disconnected from their batteries.
- b) Those travelling in the VClO may take up to 66 lbs of personal baggage.

2. INSURANCE

- a) No refund of insurance premium is payable from public funds for officers on short-term visits overseas.
- b) Those travelling by RAF aircraft are subject to the same statutory limits of compensation as apply to carriage by commercial airlines but international journeys to or from the UK with an agreed stopping place in the United States are governed by the provisions of the IATA/Montreal Agreement which include a compensation limit higher than the statutory one. Prospective travellers in RAF aircraft are advised to check whether their personal insurance policies provide cover for travelling by non-commercial flights and to consult their insurers if they are in any doubt about their position.
- when the personal property (other than money or luxury articles) of an officer sent overseas on a short-term visit is lost or damaged during transit to or from the UK or while he is in receipt of subsistence allowance (but not local allowances and DSA) during his stay overseas and the loss or damage is not covered by an existing insurance policy, and the officer himself has not been negligent, compensation may be paid at the discretion of PSD for Diplomatic Service Officers or of the Finance Division of the Cabinet Office for No 10 Downing Street staff. The amount of compensation would be based on the current cost of replacing the articles less an amount for depreciation or, if less, the full cost of repair.







Additional communications will be provided by secure facsimile which will be installed in the General Office.

7. The secure facsimile will allow texts to be exchanged with No 10 Downing Street via the Cabinet Office. The system may be used for material up to SECRET.

BRAHMS SECURE SPEECH

8. Brahms will be available for use by the Private Office and will be installed by the Communications Co-ordinator.

PRIVATE OFFICE

9. The Private Office will be set up in the Govenor's Private Office located on the ground floor. It will have, in addition to the normal telephones 2 Direct Exchange Lines (DELs) and a private wire to No 10 Downing Street.

GENERAL OFFICE

10. The General Office will be set up in the office of the Govenor's Secretary. It will have, in addition to the normal telephones, 3 Direct Exchange Lines and 1 private wire to No 10 Downing Street.

TELEPHONE FACILITIES

- 11. The following facilities will be available:
 - Normal residence telephones;
 - ii. Additional Direct Exchange Lines with International Direct Dial (IDD) access in the Private and General offices and in the senior official's rooms;
 - iii. Direct private lines between No 10 Switchboard and the Private and General Offices in Government House.

LOCAL RADIO

12. Local radio will be provided for the Administration Team and Protection Officers, clearance for its use has been sought.

CELLULAR RADIO

13. Three (3) cellular telephones will be made available for the use of the Prime Minister's Party.

PRIME MINISTER'S TO BERMUDA AND MEETING WITH PRESIDENT BUSH

Thank you for your letter of 6 April covering the entirely admirable arrangements for the Prime Minister's meeting with President Bush in Bermuda. I am most grateful to all those who have taken a hand in preparing them - and in particular to David Burns for going out to Bermuda with the recce team. I have taken the Prime Minister through the main points and she is well content.

To take the various points on which you seek confirmation in order:

- I agree that the Prime Minister and the Governor should advance to within 30 yards or so of the President's helicopter to greet him and do the introduction, before walking back together for the formal arrival ceremony.
- I agree we should hold the talks in the Drawing Room of Government House and am content with the arrangements of furniture which you propose.
- the Prime Minister is adamant that she would want only Sir Antony Acland and me present on our side for the talks. It is up to the Americans how many they have, but the Prime Minister's preference is to keep it reasonably small. She would not want Press Spokesmen present for either the morning or the afternoon talks, but would be happy for Mr. Fitzwater and Bernard Ingham to attend the lunch.
- I see no objection to the Bermuda Information Service announcing the main elements of the programme some 48 hours before the Prime Minister's arrival.
- There is no problem over the Prime Minister's arrival time at HMS Arrow.

- We would like to check the <u>placement</u> for dinner before it is finalised.
- We can agree to the £3,000 for the Royal Marines Band.
- Mr. Thatcher is well content with the programme proposed for him on Friday, 13 April.

Prime Minister's visit to Bermuda and meeting with President Bush Thank you for your letter of 4 April. We have replied to the Governor and told the Hon. Quentin Edness, MP (who is already in London) of the Prime Minister's invitation to him to travel to Bermuda aboard the VC.10. The UK recce team returned from Bermuda on 5 April, having agreed with the Governor, the Americans and Bermudians the detailed arrangements in the attached programme. Peter Bean will report separately on the press arrangements (the programme mentions the main ones) and Colonel Williams and the Prime Minister's Personal Protection Officer on outstanding security issues (the main one is a protected vehicle). Sheila Waghorn will be in touch about administrative arrangements, all of which seem satisfactory. At this stage, I would highlight the following: Prime Minister's arrival in Bermuda We have tried to make this both grander and warmer (band, guard of honour, presentation of bouquet etc). Edness' emergence from the VC10 should also add a nice touch from the standpoint of Anglo-Bermudian relations. Anglo-Bermudian programme on arrival day (12 April) The Premier told David Burns that he wanted the Prime Minister to enjoy her visit, had told his Cabinet not to raise anything confrontational/controversial, and wished to conduct her personally on serials 13 - 27. With the Governor's agreement, the recce team worked closely with the Secretary to the Bermudian Cabinet to organise a programme of visits which shows to advantage the beauty of the island and the attempt being made to develop the old naval dockyard for tourist/retail/housing purposes. Unfortunately, the work on the main retail centre is not advanced sufficiently for a visit inside the "Clock Tower" building (the Premier said that he would be embarrassed, if this were included); but the exterior, and the development plans which Bermuda is pursuing, deserve a few minutes before the Prime Minister moves to the craft market and Maritime CONFIDENTIAL



Museum. The recce team looked carefully at the latter and are satisfied that it will hold enough interest for the Prime Minister and also provide some good press shots. (The first of two rooms which she will visit contains a link to Gallipolit). As you requested, we are preparing some notes on which you can draw for the Prime Minister's response at the Premier's dinner that evening.

President Bush's arrival on 13 April

Serials 35 - 52 of the attached programme are the arrangements for meeting the President on his arrival at Government House. The Governor and recce team have tried to provide pageantry without excessive formality. The Governor's first thought was that the Prime Minister should receive the President at the top of a flight of steps some 150 yards from where the Presidential helicopter will land, with the President walking that distance with his Chief of Protocol, while the welcoming party remained immobile. The recce party thought the Prime Minister would want to greet the President closer to the helicopter and have now agreed with the Governor that the greeting party should advance to within 30 yards of the helicopter, once the engines are cut and the rotor down-draught begins to subside. This takes a minute to a minute and a half and the helicopter doors cannot in any case open until the rotors are still. Given that interval (and with the aid of the US Secret Service) the Governor is content that he can bring the Prime Minister to within some 20 - 30 yards of the helicopter door in good order. Since Bush will be accompanied on Marine One by Secretary Baker, Governor Sununu and General Scowcroft, as well as by Ambassador Reed (Chief of White House Protocol), we thought introductions at that point (before the cameras) would strike the right note of old friends meeting (against a background of a 21-gun salute) prior to the formality of the US national anthem, inspection of guard of honour etc. For the latter, the party will walk (back) some 150 yards past three groups of press, providing further good initial photo opportunities. The enclosed rough / sketch tries to illustrate this aspect.

Location of US-UK bilateral talks

Subject to your agreement, we suggest talks in the Drawing Room of Government House (see enclosed plan). Although perhaps larger than we would have liked, it is a light airy room giving onto a verandah, and beyond that a small lawn around the swimming pool where there will be comfortable garden furniture. The recce team agreed with the Governor that a group of 3 (three person) sofas and 2 armchairs would be arranged (similar to Camp David) to accommodate a maximum of 8 participants (see below). After the initial photocall (Prime Minister and President only), the participants could have coffee/soft drinks and wander outside. There is no security objection.



Participation in the US/UK talks/lunch

The US team is still not final. The recce were told that the President, Secretary Baker, General Scowcroft, Ambassador Catto and Governor Sununu would attend (together with probably Robert Zoellick, Marlin Fitzwater, Bob Blackwill and Ray Seitz). Our team made clear the Prime Minister's preference for strictly limited numbers. The UK side would be three strong and we thought the US side should be those mentioned above before the brackets. Unless you disagree, we shall hold to this position until we have a final list of the US side. The Americans will almost certainly want Fitzwater to attend the talks.

As agreed with you, we have restricted lunch to the participants. However, would the Prime Minister wish to include other Presidential Advisers, if they come? When the numbers are firm, the Governor will decide between a round table seating 10 (rather closely) and his main oblong dining table which can be shortened by a few places from its normal 24-place length.

Press Conference/publicity

This will be outdoors (unless rain prevents it) with a backdrop of palm trees and the ocean. Bermuda being so small a society, it is difficult to prevent news of arrangements spreading. We also wish actively to encourage attendance at the various 'public' events. If you agree, the Bermuda Information Service propose to announce the main elements of the programme some 48 hours before the Prime Minister's arrival.

HMS ARROW

The arrival time for the Prime Minister (serial 66) may seem early but we thought she might wish to chat briefly with the Captain and officers at the reception (she will of course see them the next day (serial 81)); and there is a need to have all 100 - 120 guests aboard (by 2 access points) before the arrival of the Premier and Lady Swan at 6.25pm.

Governor's dinner

Neither the Americans nor we favoured set-piece speeches, hence the arrangements at serial 78. The placement will need careful thought when the US team is finally known. On the assumption that all those mentioned above attend, plus Ambassador Reed, Mrs Catto and the US Consul-General and Mrs Gaines, we should need to seat 10 Americans. The UK side would consist of the Prime Minister and Mr Thatcher, the Governor and Lady Langley, Sir Antony Acland, yourself, Bernard Ingham and the Governor's ADC, making a total of 8.



This would leave room for two other Bermudian couples, in addition to the Premier and Lady Swan. The Governor is well seized of the need for the Prime Minister to have the President next to her and will let us have suggestions for placement once the full guest list is known. At that point, he will also consult us about whom we would like to see seated next to each other.

Royal Marines Band

We hope that Cabinet Office approval will be forthcoming quickly for the f3,000 it will now cost to have the band. It will add an important dimension to the band of the Bermuda Regiment (with which it will play as a joint "massed" band). In its six-man form, it will also greatly add to the Governor's dinner.

The programme for the morning of departure, 14 April

Serials 80 - 89 need little amplification, save perhaps to say that the ship "Deliverance" is a replica of a vessel which those who were initially shipwrecked on Bermuda (and found the Islands) subsequently built to seek assistance. The whole area of St George (which the Prime Minister has visited briefly before) is particularly attractive and good photo opportunity stuff.

Mr Thatcher's programme

The Governor and recce team found it impossible to arrange any formal business meetings for Mr Thatcher on Good Friday, nor were there any particular sporting events scheduled which he could attend. In Bermuda the day is given over to going to Church, visiting friends and flying kites. As originally arranged, there was hardly time in the programme for Mr Thatcher to lunch, play a <u>full</u> round of golf that day and return to Government House in time to relax before the evening's events. In the circumstances, the Governor and the recce team thought the best solution would be to arrange for Mr Thatcher to meet some businessmen for discussions over lunch at the Mid-Ocean Club, continuing their talks over 9 holes of golf. (He will be able to play more golf over the weekend.) Is this acceptable?

Climate

The recce team experienced more humidity, cloud and showers than they had expected. Light-weight suits were certainly the order of the day. Protocol Department will be giving separate guidance on this aspect.



I have seen Hamilton telegram nos 66 and 67 with the latest version of the Prime Minister's programme in Bermuda which seems very much on the right lines. As regards the points requiring a decision in Hamilton telegram no 67, I have the following comments:

- The draft programme is an excellent basis for discussion with the United States advance party.
- We can offer the Hon. Quinton Edness MP a seat on the VC10. But it should be made plain to him that his only contact with the Prime Minister would probably be at lunch.
- I am sure the Prime Minister will be happy to cover developments in Europe and the situation in South Africa in her meeting with the Bermudan Cabinet. She will also be content to refer to our assistance to drug interdiction.



PRIME MINISTER'S MEETING WITH PRESIDENT BUSH IN BERMUDA

Thank you for your letter of 28 March about the arrangements for the Prime Minister's meeting with President Bush in Bermuda. To take your points in order:

- quite understood that the President will stay with the US Consul-General as a personal friend.
- I agree we should now try to clinch the reception on board HMS Arrow.
- I agree that the first session of talks should be 1115-1245, followed by lunch and kite-flying. The talks could resume at 1415. My guess is that the Prime Minister and the President may not want all the time until 1615 for further talks. We might put 1415-1545/1600.
- I see no harm in reversing the order of the tree-planting and the press conference.
- I think there is enough private time. But we shall need to allow for a hairdresser on Thursday evening, Friday morning and possibly Friday evening.
- I agree we should drop the call on the Mayor of St Georges, and return slightly earlier to the United Kingdom on Saturday.
- the briefing sounds right. But the President rather likes to work through the whole gamut of world problems, so it would be helpful to have brief notes on all the main current issues.
- lets avoid formal speeches.
- I agree the band is expensive. But <u>a</u> band is very important, to give a bit of colour and pageantry to the occasion. I do not know how good the Bermuda Regiment band

are. If they are the equal of a good British regimental band, that might serve. Otherwise we may have to contemplate the expense (could we take some on the VC10 to reduce costs?).

Prime Minister's meeting with President Bush in Bermuda: 12-14 April

Programme

You will by now have seen Washington telno 725 reflecting action agreed in our conversation yesterday evening. The President seems determined to stay with the US Consul General on Bermuda. If you agree, we shall accept this situation and plan accordingly; Gaines' house is in downtown Hamilton so that the arrangements should not present major administrative problems. Scowcroft's reaction is encouraging for the reception aboard HMS Arrow. We are asking the Ambassador to ensure that this is firmly in the US programme before the two recce teams meet in Bermuda next week.

We should also welcome decisions on the following aspects of the draft programme in Hamilton telno 53 (enclosed):

- Duration of PM's talks with the President: We suggest that the morning session be extended from 11.15 12.45, putting the kite flying back until after lunch (12.45 14.00). The talks might resume at 14.15 and run until 16.15., giving some 3½ hours in all (plus the lunch). We have yet to hear from Washington whether Secretary Baker will come to Bermuda for the talks or only to play golf with the President on the Saturday.
- News Conference/tree planting and photocall: Subject to the advice of your press office, we suggest that the order of these be reversed to ensure a larger attendance at the tree planting/ photocall.
- Private time for Prime Minister: Will the Prime Minister require more time than the programme currently allows before the receptions on the nights of Thursday 12 April and Friday 13 April?
- Departure for UK: While we agree that it would be right for the Prime Minister and Mr Thatcher to call on the Mayor of Hamilton, a call on the Mayor of St George is



not necessary. The Prime Minister might prefer to revisit HMS Arrow to present a long service medal to a member of the ship's crew or to depart Bermuda an hour or so earlier so that she does not reach Chequers so late.

Briefing

I propose to send you two briefing letters, one covering Anglo-Bermudian aspects of the programme and the other the Prime Minister's talks with the President. The State Department and we see European issues and arms control as the main focus of the latter and agree that the aim should be to have a real discussion. Clearly there are other matters which the Prime Minister should bring up, or which President Bush may wish to raise. But there seems every advantage in avoiding a tedious tour d'horizon and instead focussing only on subjects where there is something new to say and the prospect of forward movement. If you agree, I shall aim to send you a briefing letter on Tuesday 10 April, covering the subjects in the enclosed list.

The Embassy will prepare the usual scene-setting telegrams. They will send an update on the domestic political situation overnight on 5 April and a major report on key European/East- West/arms control issues as soon as possible after the 4 - 6 April Baker/Shevardnadze talks. They will also update on regional issues, as necessary, nearer the time.

Speech/Extended toast

When President Bush dined at Downing Street on 1 June last year, he and the Prime Minister exchanged extended toasts before the television cameras. Given the press conference earlier in the evening and the more relaxed "family" aspect of the Bermuda meeting, we see no need to create such a television opportunity. However, I should welcome your advice.

Finance

We have managed to obtain HMS Arrow without additional cost. While we can fly the Cinq Fleet Military Band to Bermuda by a Hercules flight travelling that way on 7 April, the cost of their return trip, subsistence for almost a week and associated travel costs etc in the UK, are substantial at some £56,721. We wonder whether the 'colour' which they will bring to the occasion justifies this cost. Might we instead ask the Governor to explore the alternative of using the band



of the Bermuda Regiment already on the island? If that does not prove suitable, I shall revert.

- 5. THE PRESIDENT AND SCOWCROFT ALSO SAID THAT I WOULD BE WELCOME TO FLY DOWN TO BERMUDA ON THE PRESIDENT'S PLANE. I SHALL DO SO. IT MAY PROVIDE A GOOD OPPORTUNITY TO TALK FURTHER TO THE PRESIDENT ON THE ISSUES IN ADVANCE OF THE PRIME MINISTER'S DISCUSSIONS WITH HIM.
- 6. FOLLOWING THESE CONVERSATIONS, WE SHOULD PLAN ON THE BASIS THAT THE ARROW RECEPTION WILL TAKE PLACE, (THOSE STILL SUBJECT TO CONFIRMATION FROM THE US SIDE), AND THAT THE PRESIDENT WILL STAY WITH THE US CONSUL-GENERAL. PRIME MINISTER'S MEETING WITH PRESIDENT BUSH IN BERMUDA

I have seen Hamilton Telegram No 53, giving a third redraft of the programme for the Prime Minister's meeting with President Bush in Bermuda. I think we have now left too little time for the President and the Prime Minister to talk: barely an hour before lunch and another hour after lunch. I think we should put the joint press conference off to 1615 or 1630, with the photocall immediately before or after, leaving another hour available for talks.

I am sorry to see from other telegrams that the White House advance staff are recommending against the President and Mrs Bush staying in Government House and against the reception on HMS Arrow. I suspect this is much more the thinking of the advance staff themselves who do not like situations where the President cannot have at least 200 people from the White House immediately adjacent to him. I think it would be very helpful if Sir Antony Acland could find some way to get through to the White House at a much higher level to ask them not to be unduly influenced by the advance staff into giving up colourful and amusing bits in the programme, such as the reception on HMS Arrow: and the very "family" image that would come from the President and Mrs Bush and the Prime Minister and Mr Thatcher all staying together with the Governor.







I have seen Hamilton telegram number 48, setting out a proposed programme for the Prime Minister's visit to Bermuda and meeting with President Bush. I think this is very much on the right lines and an excellent first draft. I have one or two observations at this stage:

- it would add greatly to the colour of the occasion if the RM band is available to play on various occasions during the visit.
- I think the Prime Minister probably will wish to attend a short Good Friday service.
- I doubt the Prime Minister and the President will want quite so much time set aside for talks on the Friday afternoon. I wonder if we should not consider using some of that time for them to do something jointly: a visit, a walkabout or something of that order. Perhaps you would ask the Governor to consider this.
- I doubt the Prime Minister would want to drive in an open Landau on the Saturday morning to City Hall. It would look a bit royal.
- the Prime Minister would be well content for President and Mrs. Bush to stay at Government House. Our minimum requirements for accommodation there would be the Prime Minister and Mr. Thatcher, HM Ambassador Washington, PS/PM, Mrs. Crawford, and one detective.

I discover that Mr. Thatcher will be travelling on from Bermuda to the United States where he has meetings on Monday 16 April. I note that it was planned for Antony Acland to travel to Bermuda with the President and perhaps to return with him. If

that is the case, could we discover whether Mr. Thatcher could travel back with the President and Mrs. Bush as well (assuming that they are not going to some other destination).

- 1. PRELIMINARY US THINKING ON ARRANGEMENTS. MY SUGGESTIONS FOR THE POSSIBLE SHAPE OF THOSE PARTS OF THE PROGRAMME WHICH INVOLVE THE PRESIDENT.

QUITE WHEN ON THE FRIDAY HE WOULD ARRIVE IN BERMUDA (PARA 5 OF TUR) HAD NOT YET BEEN ADDRESSED. BUT BERMUDA WAS EFFECTIVELY A THREE HOUR FLIGHT FROM WASHINGTON (TWO HOUR FLIGHT, ONE HOUR TIME CHANGE), IF WE ENVISAGED A MORNING SESSION OF TALKS, HE WOULD NEED TO LEAVE WASHINGTON EARLY THAT MORNING. ON THE SATURDAY MORNING, THE PRESIDENT WOULD STAY ON TO SEE PRIME MINISTER SWAN (AN OLD FRIEND) AND PERHAPS TO FIT IN SOME GOLF. THEY EMPHASISED THAT HE WOULD BE HAPPY TO DO ALL THIS IN AN INFORMAL AND UNOFFICIAL MANNER. THE PRIME MINISTER SHOULD NOT IN ANY WAY FEEL THAT SHE NEEDED TO PROVIDE AN OFFICIAL HOST TO ACCOMPANY HIM.
- 4. AS TO THE US PARTY (HAMILTON TELNO 41), THE ADVANCE OFFICE THOUGHT THAT BAKER MIGHT ACCOMPANY THE PRESIDENT. ALTHOUGH BAKER HAD NOT BEEN AT LAST NOVEMBER'S TALKS AT CAMP DAVID, HE LIKED TO ATTEND THIS TYPE OF EVENT IF HE COULD. SCOWCROFT, ONE OF GATES OR BLACKWILL, FITZWATER, AMBASSADOR CATTO AND SEITZ (STATE) WOULD PROBABLY GO, AND MRS BUSH WOULD DEFINITELY ACCOMPANY THE PRESIDENT. WE SAID THAT THE PRIME MINISTER'S PARTY WOULD BE VERY SMALL. SHE WAS LIKELY TO BE ACCOMPANIED ONLY BY POWELL, INGHAM AND SUPPORT STAFF, PLUS MYSELF (YOUR TELNO 53, HAMILTON TELNO 41 PARA 6). MR THATCHER WOULD PROBABLY ALSO ACCOMPANY HER.

I HOPE TO ARRIVE ON THE AFTERNOON OF 12 APRIL AND RETURN TO LONDON ON SATURDAY THE 14TH. I UNDERSTAND THAT PRESIDENT BUSH WILL ARRIVE ON FRIDAY, 13 APRIL, AND MAY STAY OVERNIGHT. WE SHALL OF COURSE LET YOU HAVE DETAILS AS SOON AS POSSIBLE. I MUCH LOOK FORWARD TO SEEING YOU AGAIN. IN THE MEANTIME, SIR DESMOND LANGLEY WILL BE IN TOUCH ABOUT ARRANGEMENTS. General Scowcroft telephone today to say that they were still working on the dates for your possible meeting with President Bush just before Easter. He was reasonably optimistic that the dates we had proposed - 11-12 April - would prove possible: and they were quite keen on having the meeting in Bermuda. He hoped to be able to confirm this next week. I said that you would not wish to inconvenience the President: and if it was easier, I was sure you would be ready to go to Washington. My impression is, however, that the Americans will probably agree to Bermuda and to the dates.

POSSIBLE MEETING BETWEEN THE PRIME MINISTER AND PRESIDENT BUSH

General Scowcroft telephoned today to say that the Americans were still working on the dates for the Prime Minister's proposed meeting with President Bush. Our suggestion of 11-12 April caused them some difficulties but he was hopeful that something could be worked out. He indicated that the Americans were quite keen on the idea of Bermuda. He promised to be in touch early next week with a firm proposal.

You will no doubt want to be turning your mind to the practical aspects of a meeting in Bermuda e.g. where it would be held, where we would stay, and so on. It would be interesting to know, for instance whether the Caribbean guard ship is likely to be in the area at the time. But it may be better not to enquire about this yet, for fear of a leak.
