I hope we are right to assume that you will not be instructing us to say anything to the Italians before the next summit in London: this would be likely to cause them some alarm and despondency. Better to wait until the two Prime Ministers are in London and come, at the end of their talks, to the item on "time and place of next meeting": it would then appear natural for Mrs Thatcher to refer to her already crowded programme for next autumn and ask the Italians to propose a later date for the next meeting in Rome.

Prime Minister agreed, that we should try to postpone the Anglo-Italian summit due to take place in Rome next autumn.

We also assume you are still working on the basis that the next London meeting should be next April, as the Frime Minister told the Ambassador while she was here (Sir R Arculus' minute of 26 November, copied to you), and that you will be asking us in good time to propose some definite dates to the Italians.





Prime Minister's Overseas Visits and Visitors 1981

Lord Carrington has been considering possible programmes of visits and visitors for the Prime Minister and himself in 1981. I enclose a schedule of existing plans at Prime Ministerial level and of Lord Carrington's additional proposals, as well as a schedule of the Foreign and Commonwealth Secretary's own plans. We assume of course that events are likely to necessitate additional visits, outward and inward, which cannot now be foreseen.

The Queen

As background, I should recall the plans for State Visits next year. The recommendations are likely to be that King Khalid of Saudi Arabia be invited in June and President Shagari of Nigeria in November. If there is a recommendation for a State Visit in March, it may be for President Marcos of the Philippines or President Banda of Malawi. The Queen will visit Norway in May, Australia for the Commonwealth Heads of Government Meeting (CHGM) in September/October, and New Zealand and Sri Lanka later in October. Canada is a possibility in July.

Outward Visits by the Prime Minister

In view of the UK Presidency in the second half of 1981, the Prime Minister may prefer to fit as many of her outward trips as possible into the first half of the year.

Lord Carrington welcomes the idea that the Prime Minister should visit the Gulf in early January.or in connection with her Indian visit in April. He suggests that the best countries to visit would be Saudi Arabia, Oman and

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the United Arab Emirates. If the Prime Minister agrees, we shall submit draft telegrams to the Posts with instructions and detailed suggestions. (There will not be time to include visits to all six Arab states in the Persian Gulf, but the Prime Minister has met in the relatively recent past the Amir of Qatar, and the Prime Ministers of Bahrain and Kuwait. They will be borne in mind for another Ministerial visit in the not too distant future.)

The proposals in the schedule for visits to the <u>US</u> and to the <u>North/South</u> Summit in Mexico need little explanation. Lord Carrington will make specific suggestions in due course. We shall also make detailed suggestions about a visit to <u>India</u> in April. A visit to <u>Spain</u> would only be appropriate if the Lisbon Agreement on <u>Gibraltar</u> is implemented. If this condition was met, a visit during the UK Presidency would be particularly appropriate. A visit to <u>Portugal</u> (Paul Lever's letter of 7 November) could be extreme<u>ly</u> brief, but the <u>Portuguese</u> would wish it to be separate from any visit to <u>Spain</u>.

The schedule of outward visits does not include an Anglo/Italian Summit in Rome in November. The Prime Minister may feel that the frequency of these meetings could be eased by suggesting in due course to the Italians that the second Summit due in 1981 might be postponed because of the UK Presidency until early 1982.

Inward Visits

Sir S Ramgoolam, although Prime Minister of Mautitius since independence, has never paid an official visit to Britain. Despite his age he is not expected to retire soon. He is firmly pro-Western and his country is among the few which have preserved the Westminster model of Parliamentary democracy. Lord Carrington recommends that Sir S Ramgoolam should be invited here in the second week of February, when the Mauritian parliament (where the government have a slender majority) will be in recess and when The Queen should be able to receive him. Given the short time available, we would be grateful to know the Prime Minister's wishes as soon as possible.

An invitation to Mr Mugabe would be an excellent way of keeping up the momentum of our relations with Zimbabwe. One of the regular Anglo/<u>Irish</u> Summits will be due in midyear and should probably be held after the Northern Ireland

local government elections in June. We shall be writing shortly with detailed suggestions about inviting \underline{M} , \underline{Barre} . It would be a suitable gesture to invite the $\underline{Belgian}$ Prime Minister for a brief visit before we hand over the Presidency to Belgium at the end of the year.

An invitation to Mr Seaga would be an excellent goodwill gesture after the change of government in Jamaica.

We have tended to neglect <u>Cameroon</u>, a stable, moderate country which is one third Anglophone. The <u>Cameroon</u> market, with its sound agricultural base and significant oil reserves, is buoyant and attractive. President Ahidjo, in office since independence in 1960, has just started another 5 year term. Lord <u>Carrington</u> recommends an official invitation in 1981.

Peru has recently returned to democratic government. The economy is strong and offers opportunities for investment and exports. Dr Ulloa, the Prime Minister, is also Minister of the Economy and Commerce and the most important person after the President. An official visit could win us a valuable friend.

The new, moderate <u>Dominican</u> Government would welcome an invitation to the Prime <u>Minister</u>, <u>Miss Charles</u>. There is advantage in demonstrating support for governments favouring stability in the volatile Eastern Caribbean.

You will see that Lord Carrington's schedule of inward visits includes the possibility of inviting the <u>Polish</u> Foreign Minister. But, depending on how things go in <u>Poland</u>, we may later wish to sound the Poles about the possibility of a higher level contact instead.

She is generally content with the proposals in Pun it but has made the following comments:-The Prime Minister wonders whether a visit by The Queen to Canada in July may not give rise to difficulties associated with the patriation of the Constitution:

- (b) The Prime Minister looks forward to seeing the draft telegrams about her visit to the Gulf in April;
- (c) The Prime Minister agrees that we should try to postpone the Anglo/Italian Summit due to take place in Rome next autumn;
 - (d) The Prime Minister agrees that Sir S. Ramgoolam should be invited here in the second week of February.
 - (e) The Prime Minister, as you know, does not wish to issue an invitation to Mr. Mugabe just now.
 - (f) The Prime Minister does not wish to rush into the next Anglo/Irish Summit;
 - (g) The Prime Minister has decided not to invite M. Barre to visit this country before the Presidential elections in France;
 - (h) The Prime Minister has noted that she will be seeing Mr. Seaga in Melbourne;
 - (i) One possible visit not mentioned in your letter is that to Strasbourg to report to the European Parliament at the end of the UK Presidency. The Prime Minister will not make up her mind as to whether or not she is prepared to do this until Mr. van Agt has made his decision.
 - (j) The Prime Minister considered that the idea of a visit to Portugal should be dropped - at least for the time being.

PRIME MINISTER'S VISIT TO ITALY

- 1. Thank you for sending us a copy of the record of the conversation between the Prime Minister and Signor Forlani on 23 November.
- 2. While the Prime Minister's party were here we were told that the conversation on East/West affairs and Poland had been somewhat disappointing and lacking in content. Michael Alexander's record tends to bear this out.
- 3. In this context it may just be of interest that when I was pressed for de-briefing on the subject by the Danish Ambassador here he told me of a conversation he had with the Secretary-General at the MFA, Malfatti, on the subject. Malfatti, who had, I think, been with Colombo, said that Gromyko had said that the margin that lay between the present situation in Poland and Soviet intervention was very clear and very narrow. The Dane said that this was a line which he knew the Russians (possibly Pravda) to have taken on another occasion.
- 4. If it is true that Gromyko spoke on these lines the question arises why Colombo should not have been more forthcoming (less so in fact than his officials, who appeared during the PUS' parallel conversation with Malfatti to be divided over how to interpret whatever Gromyko had really said and meant). There is a conspiracy theory which might account for it based upon the belief that Colombo has been too close to the Socialists (PSI),eg over Malta,for the taste of most of his DC colleagues. It is argued that Colombo's Moscow and Warsaw visits were not well regarded by the DC and that Colombo, while going through the motions of debriefing himself with his colleagues, has been

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careful not to make too much of it. Like most conspiracy theories it is far from certainly true, but it could just explain why Colombo so signally failed to take an easy trick and show himself a world statesman with revealing insights into Soviet/Polish thinking.

5. May I leave it to you to copy this letter elsewhere only if you or EESD find it plausible or interesting.

Visit of the Prime Minister the Rt. Honble. Mrs Thatcher MP to His Holiness Pope John Paul II on 24 November 1980

Summary

- 1. Accompanied by Sir M Palliser, and others, Mrs Thatcher visited the Vatican on 24 November. She arrived in Rome the day before for talks with the Italian authorities. The Vatican were flexible in arranging the visit. (Paragraphs 1 2).
- 2. On arrival Mrs Thatcher and her party were conducted to the apartment of the Cardinal Secretary of State, with whom she reviewed the international scene and discussed Northern Ireland.

 (Paragraphs 3 4).
- 3. Mrs Thatcher was received by the Pope at 10.30 am. Their talk lasted longer than expected. The visit was welcomed by the Vatican and came at an opportune moment. (Paragraphs 5 6).

The Prime Minister's Visit to the Pope

- 1. Accompanied by the Permanent Under-Secretary of State, Sir Michael Palliser, Mr Michael Franklin, her Assistant Private Secretary, Mr Alexander, myself, and others, the Prime Minister paid an informal visit to the Vatican on Monday the 24th of November. The purpose of the visit was to call on His Holiness Pope John Paul II. This was arranged for 10.30 am and took place without advisers present.
- 2. Mrs Thatcher arrived in Rome on Sunday the 23rd of November for talks with the Italian authorities: plans had been made for her to call on the Pope the following afternoon. The Vatican welcomed the prospect of Mrs Thatcher's visit and the Secretariat went out of their way to enable it to take place despite the limited time available. When it became clear that the Prime Minister would have to be back in England earlier than planned, in order to attend that day's debate, the Vatican proved ready and willing to readjust the programme

/ so

so that the Prime Minister would still have the opportunity of a private talk with the Pope.

- 3. The Prime Minister and her party left the Quirinal for the Vatican at 09.40 am on the 24th of November. Their arrival in the courtyard of San Damaso was marked by the presence of the Swiss Guard, drawn up in the Prime Minister's honour. The party descended from their cars and, accompanied by a Gentleman of His Holiness, proceeded to the first floor of the Secretariat building to call on the Cardinal Secretary of State. It was arranged that this call should, exceptionally, take place before the call on the Pope himself since the latter never receives visitors before 10.30 am and time was at a premium.
- 4. As reported in my telegram No. 46, the main subjects covered in the talk with Cardinal Casaroli were Northern Ireland; the role of the Community; developments at Madrid on the Conference for Security and Cooperation in Europe and the problem of securing freedom of religion. There was a brief discussion about the qualities of Governor Reagan and about the problems of the Middle East. Cardinal Casaroli said that the balance of terror between the United States and the USSR at least ensured some degree of detente and that this was better than none.

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- 5. After the call on the Secretary of State the party proceeded to the second floor where Mrs Thatcher was shown into the Pope's Private Library at 10.30 am. The Secretariat expected that the private talk with the Pope would last some twenty minutes. In fact it was nearer forty-five. After members of her party had been received, the Prime Minister was conducted to the main entrance on the courtyard of San Damaso, where the Swiss Guard presented arms as the Prime Minister left.
- 6. Although the visit was a brief and informal one, it was clearly welcome to the Vatican. The Pope's message to Mrs Thatcher of the 29th of October is evidence of the pressures on the Vatican as a result of the behaviour of the hunger strikers at the Maze prison. The fact that the Prime Minister has been able to discuss this and related matters privately and at length with the Pope will counter this pressure.

I am sending a copy of this despatch to Her Majesty's Ambassador to the Quirinal.

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Prime Minister's visit to the Vatican

During her visit to the Vatican yesterday morning, the Prime Minister discussed international affairs with Cardinal Secretary of State Casaroli. The Permanent Under Secretary and Sir Mark Heath were also present. I have recorded separately the discussion about Northern Ireland.

In the course of a general discussion of the world situation, the Prime Minister commented on the importance of Europe's position as an area of stability in the world. Cardinal Casaroli agreed about the need to ensure that Europe's contribution to a solution of the world's difficulties was not lost. International life had reached a very critical point. The Europeans needed to draw on their long experience to look into the heart of problems. It was regrettable that we had to rely on the balance of terror between the USA and the USSR to ensure some degree of stability but this was, at least, better than nothing. Commenting on Governor Reagan, Cardinal Casaroli said that he did not question his goodwill but he wondered about how deep his political wisdom was. However he knew that Governor Reagan was a good listener and had some good advisers. This was a source of confidence. But the Europeans would certainly have a role to play; the United States needed their help. The Prime Minister described her talk the previous day with Chancellor Schmidt and said that she was optimistic. She thought that Mr. Reagan would prove himself to be a man of peace. He would give a strong lead. But he would, of course, wish to see reciprocal action by the Soviet Union. She agreed that the Europeans could influence the situation if they were clear and consistent in their policies.

In response to a question from the Prime Minister, Cardinal Casaroli said that the Vatican was studying developments in East/West relations very closely. They regarded religious freedom as indivisible and as something which could not be separated from ordinary human freedoms. Representatives of the Holy See intervened only discreetly in Madrid, but when they did so it was to make this point. They did not regard the Orthodox Church in the Soviet Union as free. In response to an observation by the Prime Minister that oppression in the Soviet Union had increased since Helsinki, MonsignorSilvestrini said that there had been

improvements between Helsinki and Belgrade but a setback subsequently. There was a sense in which Helsinki had raised too many hopes. People had expected more and more, and regimes in Eastern Europe had had a "reaction of rejection". The attitude of the US delegate in Belgrade, Mr. Arthur Goldberg, had not been helpful. He had tended to think of everything in terms of the position of Jews in the Soviet Union. The Soviet invasion of Afghanistan had, of course, changed the situation greatly. Cardinal Casaroli said that none the less some things had been won. There had, for instance, been a substantial improvement in the distribution of religious literature in the vernacular in Communist countries since Helsinki. The Prime Minister commented that it was important not to be satisfied with too little.

In the course of the brief exchange on the status of Jerusalem, Cardinal Casaroli said that the Holy See supported a solution based on internationalisation. This was the only way to safeguard the future of a city which had been "given to the world". However, the Holy See did not make a dogma of this and avoided using the word 'internationalisation'. They contented themselves with saying that the city should have a special status under which equality of rights would be ensured for the various religions concerned with the city.

BEGINS

YOUR HOLINESS.

I GREATLY APPRECIATED THE PRIVILEGE OF BEING RECEIVED BY YOU DURING MY VISIT TO THE HOLY SEE. I DERIVED ENCOURAGEMENT INSTRUCTION AND INSPIRATION FROM OUR DISCUSSION, YOUR MISDOM AND EXPERIENCE ARE OF INESTIMABLE VALUE TO US ALL. I WILL CONTINUE TO REFLECT FOR A LONG TIME ON WHAT YOU SAID.

YOUR SECRETARY OF STATE KINDLY TOLD ME OF THE IDEAS OF SOME MEMBERS OF THE ROMAN CATHOLIC CHURCH IN NORTHERN IRELAND FOR ENDING THE PRESENT HUNGER STRIKE AT THE MAZE PRISON IN NORTHERN IRELAND. I EXPLAINED THE DEEP CONCERN OF THE GOVERNMENT AT THE IMPLICATIONS OF THE HUNGER STRIKE, WHICH CAN BRING NO BENEFIT TO THOSE INVOLVED AND THREATENS TO BRING .VIOLENCE AND BLOODSHED TO THE PEOPLE OF NORTHERN IRELAND. I ALSO EXPLAINED WHY WE ARE FIRMLY RESOLVED THAT IT WOULD BE UTTERLY WRONG TO TAKE ANY STEPS WHICH CONCEDED THAT POLITICAL MOTIVES CAN EXCUSE MURDER OR OTHER SERIOUS CRIMES. WE ARE NOW GREATLY ENCOURAGED. HOWEVER, BY THE STATEMENT THAT HAS BEEN MADE BY CARDINAL O'FIAICH AND HIS EPISCOPAL COLLEAGUES. THEY HAVE MADE AN IMPASSIONED PLEA TO THE HUNGER STRIKERS TO GIVE UP A CLAIM THAT CAN SO GRAVELY IMPERIL THE LIFE AND SAFETY OF OTHERS. WE MUST ALL DEVOUTLY HOPE THAT THE BISHOPS' PRAYER WILL MOVE ALL THOSE WHO HAVE ANY INFLUENCE IN THE MATTER TO STRIVE TO BRING AN END TO THE PRESENT DANGERS.

IT IS IN THAT LIGHT THAT THE SOVERNMENT APPROACHES THE INITIATIVE TAKEN BY THO OF THE CHAPLAINS AT THE MAZE PRISON, TO WHICH YOUR SECRETARY OF STATE REFERRED, WE HAVE NOW HEARD THEIR IDEAS IN FULL DETAIL. ME APPRECIATE THEIR EARNEST CONCERN THAT THERE SHALL BE NO LOSS OF LIFE, BUT THE PACKAGE OF CONCESSIONS THEY HAVE IN MIND MOULD GIVE BOTH THE PROTESTERS

IN THE PRISON AND THE PEOPLE OF NORTHERN IRELAND CAUSE TO BELLEVE THAT THE TERRORIST PRISONERS WERE BEING GRANTED POLITICAL STATUS. THE HUNGER STRIKERS AND THE PROVISIONAL IRISH REPUBLICAN ARMY MOULD BE QUICK TO CLAIM A VICTORY. THIS MOULD DISASTROUSLY UNDERWINE THE ASPIRATIONS OF THE BISHOPS FOR AN END TO THE VIOLENCE. HE MINISTER TO THE HOLY SEE WILL BE ABLE TO EXPLAIN NORE FULLY MAY ME HAVE TO TAKE THE VIEW THAT IT MOULD BE WRONG TO MAKE THESE CONCESSIONS.

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Transcript of Interview:

Mrs. Thatcher:

..... (first words not on tape) to hear of the earthquake in Potenza and several cities of the South. We were with Signor Colombo last evening when news came and of course as you know he went immediately. Our very great sympathy to the people of Italy and to the many families who suffered so deeply from this tragedy.

Interviewer:

Thank you Mrs. Thatcher. Mrs. Thatcher, could you summarise in a few words the results of your Rome meeting and what can in your opinion Italy and England do together, and what should they accomplish together.

Mrs. Thatcher:

These meetings between two nations, Britain and Italy, are always extremely important. It isn't so much that you can enumerate specific things, its just that by coming and talking for much longer time than one would normally be able to, you get a much greater understanding of the other persons view-point. I spoke for about an hour and a half with your Prime Minister last evening and then we were joined by the Foreign Ministers and went on talking so we really covered the whole range of international affairs and also one naturally asked about the

problems in Italy and got a greater understanding of that.

Interviewer:

Mrs. Thatcher we have read with very much interest your speech at the Lord Nayor's banquet and the speech of Lord Carrington in Hamburg about Britain's engagement to Europe. In the meantime there is a new group within the Parliamentary Party of 38 MPs who is not entirely pro-Eurable (??); at least they want so (?) radical changes in the link with Europe which may prejudice (??) the link itself. Your pro-European attitude and the pro-European attitude of Lord Carrington - is it shared by the whole of the British Government and by the whole Parliamentary Party or not?

Mrs. Thatcher:

It is shared by the whole British Government. There have always been one or two in the Parliamentary Party who have had different views but that new group is not suggesting any withdrawal from Europe in any way. It certainly is suggesting some changes but then Europe itself is talking about structural change. We have to restructure the budget, as you know. Its not really fair to some nations, and if there is ever a feeling of unfairness between partners then we have to deal with it because it can't go on, and also we have to look at the proportions spent on the Common Agricultural Policy because such a lot of money at the moment is going to building up surpluses that we don't want and can't eat and have to sell off cheaply to others. So even the Community itself is talking about change and that group I think is set up to pursue their own views about change but there is no question of withdrawal from Europe.

Interviewer:

One last question Mrs. Thatcher. Applying arithmetics to Western

Summits - are you in favour of what has for instance been suggested by
the French of having the Big Four or having the Five or having the Seven?

Mrs. Thatcher:

I was asked this question in Bonn last week but there has been no suggestion of what is called colloquially "Another Guadaloupe". That is not before us at the moment. And you know we do work together in so many groups; we work together not only bilaterally; we work in the Community; we work in NATO and very recently we were in Venice as the Seven. So we are constant by meeting, constantly trying to form a common view on world problems and a common defence of the western way of life. So that problem just doesn't arise at the moment and I give you the same answer as I gave in Bonn: let us get on working together with the summits we have arranged and with the groupings of which we are all members.

Thank you Mrs. Thatcher. Grazie.

Its been a great pleasure, thank you.

RECORD OF A CONVERSATION BETWEEN THE PRIME MINISTER AND THE PRIME MINISTER OF ITALY, SIGNOR ARNALDO FORLANI, AT THE VILLA MADAMA IN ROME ON 23 NOVEMBER 1980 ATN 2000 HOURS

East/West Relations

Signor Forlani asked Signor Colombo to describe his recent visit to Moscow. Signor Colombo said that the climate had been extremely cordial. The Russians had made it clear that they wished to develop bilateral contacts with Western countries. They did not however wish to deal with Western groups e.g. the European Community - as such, Signor Colombo agreed with the Prime Minister that the Russians hoped to keep the West fragmented.

Signor Colombo had had five hours of talks with Mr. Gromyko and one and a half hours of talks with Mr. Brezhnev. Mr. Brezhnev was in good health. He had spent twenty minutes reading a prepared document and thereafter had participated actively in a lively discussion. Mr. Brezhnev had asked him to tell his colleagues in the West that the Russians wanted detente. He wanted better contacts with the West because of the opportunity it gave the Soviet Government to improve the living standards of their people. The Prime Minister asked whether Signor Colombo had accepted his hosts' line. Had he taxed them with the recent wave of oppression in the Soviet Union?

Signor Colombo said that he had concentrated on one problem;
Afghanistan. Mr. Gromyko had replied on standard lines. Mr. Brezhnev
had avoided giving any specific reply. They talked as though detente
could be pursued quite separately from events in Afghanistan. They

/regarded

regarded the latter as a fait accompli. The Prime Minister commented that they wanted us to regard it in the same light.

Signor Colombo said that the Russians professed to be disappointed about progress in the various talks on disarmament. They had hoped for more from the talks in Geneva. They tended to explain the absence of progress by referring to the fact that we were now in a transitional period. Mr. Brezhnev hoped that the ratification of SALT II could be completed or at least that its main elements could be carried forward. The Russians were not inclined to pre-judge President Reagan's Administration. They had adopted a wait and see attitude.

Signor Colombo commented that he had been in Warsaw the day before his visit to Moscow. This had also been the day before _ the Polish Supreme Court's decision. He had told the Russians that the Italian Government had pursued a strict policy of non-interference in Polish affairs. They considered that this rule should be a rule for everybody. Interference by one state in the affairs of another was inconsistent with detente. Mr. Gromyko had agreed with him strongly and had said that the Polish problem was one for the Poles themselves to solve.

Middle East

Mr. Gromyko had also described the Iran/Iraq conflict as stupid and useless. In describing Soviet attitudes towards the conflict, Signor Colombo said that when the Deputy Prime Minister of Iraq had visited Moscow recently he had been refused arms and spare parts despite the existence of a Treaty of Co-operation between Iraq and the Soviet Union. Soviet spokesmen had not denied the existence of the Treaty but had referred to the fact that their Friendship Treaty with Iran was of far longer standing. The Prime Minister said it would not be surprising if it turned out that the Russians were withholding arms from Iraq and offering them to Iran. Signor Colombo said that he thought that the Russians were hoping to increase their influence in Iran. It was noteworthy that the Tudeh Party were emerging more clearly as the only

/organised

organised force in the midst of the increasing chaos in Iran. Soviet behaviour generally and in particular in the United Nations was consistent with a desire to keep their hands clean so that in due course they could intervene in Iran in support of the Tudeh Party. The only encouraging development was that as a result of the war with Iraq, the position of the army had been re-inforced.

Signor Colombo said that Britain and Italy would face a common problem if and when the hostages were released. What should they do about the spare parts which they would then be in a position to supply to Iran. The <u>Prime Minister</u> agreed that this was a difficult problem. She said that the British and Italian Governments should keep in very close touch. <u>Signor Forlani</u> agreed. He hoped that the release of the hostages might introduce an element of movement into the general situation and would thereby enable the conflict with Iraq to be ended.

The <u>Prime Minister</u> asked whether the Italians were still getting oil from Iraq. Signor Colombo said that they were.

They had had an arrangement with the Iraqis for supply from other sources e.g. Saudi Arabia in the event of an interruption of supply. But the Iraqis were now supplying oil at between 70 and 80% of the pre-war level. Italy had been getting about 20 million tonnes a year i.e. about 20% of their total supply. The <u>Prime Minister</u> said that this was good news. If the oil was flowing on this scale it would take pressure off the spot market. It served to confirm other evidence that damage to the oil installations, including the pipelines, was not as great as had been previously assumed.

The discussion ended with a general talk about the new US Administration and about some of the possible office-holders in it. The Foreign and Commonwealth Secretary commented that it would be wrong to assume that Mr. Haig, who seemed to be the front-runner for the position of Secretary of State, was "just a General". He had run the White House for some time at the end of the Nixon presidency and was a very sophisticated man. The Prime Minister said that she doubted whether there would be much difference

/between

between a Reagan Presidency and a Carter Presidency on the great issues of peace and war. Both recognised the need to be as strong as the other side. Both would wish to try and establish a balance at a lower level. The conversation ended at 2030.

Pant.

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The two Heads of Government began with a discussion of Community problems. The Prime Minister repeated her gratitude for the help given by the Italian Presidency in finding a solution to Britain's budget problem in the spring. Referring to current problems, she said that it would be important to find solutions to the difficulties over New Zealand butter and the negotiations on a Common Fisheries Policy. However she was convinced that the worst of the immediate problems had now been resolved. She and Signor Forlani agreed that a two-speed Europe was unacceptable to them.

In a discussion of Italy's oil supply situation, Signor Forlani said that the cessation of oil supplies from Iran created substantial difficulties for Italy. They were now getting more oil from Saudi Arabia and some from Venezuela. Supplies from Iraq were returning to not far short of the level that had obtained before the war between Iran and Iraq. Signor Forlani had expressed some concern about his country's relations with Libya. Colonel Qadhafi was unbalanced. He might react badly to Italy's recent neutrality agreement with Malta. Italy's fishing agreements with Libya might be at risk.

The Prime Minister and Signor Forlani were both optimistic about the prospects for Governor Reagan's Administration.

The Prime Minister thought that Signor Forlani's views on the Middle East question and its handling at the forthcoming European Council were very similar to ours. Signor Forlani saw no need for a new initiative next week. The Foreign and Commonwealth Secretary thought that Signor Colombo might have more ambitious ideas than his Prime Minister. He seemed to be hoping that the Foreign Ministers would be instructed by the Heads of Government to construct a blueprint for the future.

Signor Forlani told the Prime Minister that Italy's economy had been very badly affected by the latest oil price rise. It was not merely that prices had gone up so sharply. Italy's oil imports tended to be invoiced in dollars, which had lately been a strong currency, while her exports had been paid for in currencies which were, relatively speaking, weak e.g. the deutschmark. The Prime Minister said that she had been impressed by one measure which the Italian Government were about to take to re-invigorate their economy. They were making arrangements for non-quoted companies to borrow through the market rather than through banks. Companies acting in this way would be excused tax on the borrowings. This would mean that they would have to pay an effective rate of about 14% at a time when inflation was running at about 20%.



1. REPORTS OF MRS THATCHER'S ARRIVAL IN ROME WERE CARRIED BY MOST PAPERS ON 24 NOVEMBER. COVERAGE WAS RESTRICTED TO ANNOUNCING THE VISIT AND POSSIBLE AGENDA FOR THE TALKS. THE VISIT WAS WIDELY REGARDED AS USEFUL AND NON-CONTROVERSIAL, REFLECTING THE GOOD RELATIONS AND NATURAL COMITY OF INTERESTS OF THE TWO COUNTRIES.

2. THE PAPERS ON 25 NOVEMBER WERE LARGELY TAKEN UP WITH THE EARTHQUAKE DISASTER. WHILE ALL REPORTED THE CONCLUSION OF THE VISIT, EDITORIAL COMMENT WAS LIMITED, PARTLY, NO DOUBT BECAUSE THERE WAS NO PRESS CONFERENCE, OR FINAL JOINT COMMUNIQUE. WHAT THEY DID HAVE TO SAY WAS HIGHLY SPECULATIVE.

3. LA REPUBBLICA (LEFT) SUGGESTED UNHELFFULLY THAT THERE WERE
DIFFERENCES OF OPINION OVER THE MIDDLE EAST SITUATION, WITH
"BRITAIN IN FAVOUR OF FREEZING ANY EUROPEAN INITIATIVE" BECAUSE
OF THE CHANGE IN US LEADERSHIP WHILST ITALY WAS IN FAVOUR OF AN
"AUTONOMOUS EUROPEAN" ROLE. AVANTI (PSI) BY CONTRAST FOUND THAT
BRITAIN WAS PREPARED TO KEEP THE VENICE INITIATIVE GOING. LA
REPUBBLICA ALSO THOUGHT THAT ALTHOUGH "PRITIAN CONSIDERED
SOVIET WITHDRAWAL FROM AFGANISTAN AN ESSENTIAL CONDITION FOR A
RESUMPTION OF DIALOGUE. ITALY MAINTAINED A MORE FLEEVIBLE APPROACH"."

4. CORRIERE DELLA SERA (LEFT OF CENTRE), UNITA (PCI) AND MESSAGGERO (CENTRE) TICKED UP THE 'TIMES' EDITORIAL OF 24 NOVEMBER,
EMPHASISING THE IMPORTANCE OF THE BRITISH ITALIAN RELATIONSHIP
WITH THE EC. ON THE OTHER HAND, IL POPOLO (DC) ARGUED THAT ITALY
WAS AGAINST ANY "LEADERSHIP" OR "DIRECTORATES" AND WAS IN
FAVOUR OF AN "MONOGENEOUS EUROPE". IL GIORNO (RIGHT OF CENTRE)
WROTE THAT THE TALKS CONFIRMED ITALY AND BRITAIN'S DESIRE TO

Prime Minister's Visit to Rome

Tony Galsworthy has sent me the attached note about the conversations at dinner in Rome on Sunday last during which he acted as interpreter. I do not think there is sufficient substance in his note to be worth circulating more widely.

CONVERSATION AT SIGHOR FORLANI'S DINNER FOR PM AND LORD CARRINGTON: 23 NOVEMBER 1980

- 1. Signor Forlani expressed anxiety about the effects of enlargement on other lediterrenean countries. The Community would have an excess of clive oil. But this was practically Tunisia's only export. If arrangements were not made, countries in Tunisia's position might be unwilling to co-operate in the Community on other matters, for instance, fisheries agreements. Signor Forlani confirmed that fisheries agreements with North African countries were very important for Italy. He asked how the common fisheries policy negotiations were going. The Frime Minister expressed optimism. Signor Forlani was clearly unbriefed on this subject.
- 2. There was some discussion on Japan. Signor Forlani explained the Alfa-Nissan agreement. It was on a small scale and could hardly durage European car interests. Nevertheless he personally did not believe the Japanese were putting capital into this project without expecting some greater opening of the market. It would have to be carefully watched.
- 3. The Prime Minister asked him about terrorism in Italy. Signor Forlam said very confidently that the Italians had had some notable successes against the terrorists. He was now confident that the fight against terrorism could and would be won. The Prime Minister expressed pleasure at this: he was the first Italian politician who had been willing to say this to her.
- 4. The Prime Minister asked Signor Forlani how he managed to run the Council of Ministers with representatives of four parties in it. Signor Forlani admitted that agreement in the Council of Ministers was generally impossible unless something had been worked out beforehand.
- 5. The Prime Minister had some discussion with Signor Colombo about his visit to Moscow. Nothing much of substance emerged, except that Signor Colombo said that he had found Brezhnev in rather better health than he had expected.
- 6. Finally both Lord Carrington and the Prime Minister expressed concern about the earthquake, and asked that Signor Forland should let them know if there was anything which the UK could do.

BRITISH EMBASSY ROME 24 November 1980



The Prime Minister raised the question herself. She told Signor Forlani that there was at present no proposal to hold a quadripartite summit and that therefore the question of Italian participation was not an actual one. She added that she fully understood the position of the Italian Government and the difficulties which flowed from the previous Italian Government's decision to accept Cruise missiles on Italian soil.

Signor Forlani, according to the Prime Minister, spoke very forcefully and at length along the expected lines. The Cruise missile decision had been taken against the wishes of the majority of opinion in Italy - though the majority against deployment had probably not been very great. Signor Cossiga's Government had been conscious of the need to support NATO. However if there was a quadripartite summit and Italy was excluded, there was a real possibility that the question would be re-opened. Given that majority opinion was against the deployment, the outcome of a reconsideration of the issue was unpredictable. Signor Forlani had ended by expressing gratitude for the Prime Minister's comprehension of the Italian Government's difficulty.

As you know, the Foreign and Commonwealth Secretary suggested that the Prime Minister should discuss the matter with Chancellor Schmidt next week. The position of the Italian Government is of course of particular importance to the Federal Republic since Italy is a non-nuclear power and her position is closer to that of the Federal Republic than is our own.

MY TELNO 612: PRIME MINISTER'S VISIT TO ITALY

1. THE PRIME MINISTER'S VISIT ON 23 AND 24 NOVEMBER ENABLED WORKING CONTACT TO BE MADE WITH SIGNOR FORLANI BEFORE THE EUROPEAN COUNCIL. THE VISIT WAS SHORTENED BY THE PRIME MINISTER'S COMMIT-MENT TO BE IN THE HOUSE OF COMMONS ON THE AFTERNOON OF 24 NOVEMBER. IT WAS NEVERTHELESS POSSIBLE TO FIT IN TETE A TETE DISCUSSIONS BETWEEN THE TWO PRIME MINISTERS AS WELL AS BETWEEN YOURSELF AND SIGNOR COLOMBO, A DINNER WHICH BROUGHT IN SEVERAL MORE MINISTERS AND BREAKFAST WITH PRESIDENT PERTINI, FOLLOWING WHICH THE PRIME MINISTER CALLED ON THE POPE (HOLY SEE TELNO 46). THERE WAS NOT TIME FOR THE PROPOSED PRESS CONFERENCE.

2. DURING THE EVENING OF 23 NOVEMBER. A MAJOR EARTHQUAKE OCCURRED IN SOUTHERN ITALY AND SIGNOR COLOMBO HAD TO RUSH OFF TO SEE TO HIS OWN DEVASTATED CONSTITUENCY. THE EXPRESSIONS OF SYMPATHY WHICH YOU AND THE PRIME MINISTER WERE ABLE TO CONVEY WILL HAVE BEEN MUCH APPRECIATED. SO WILL THE PERSONAL MESSAGE FROM HER MAJESTY TO PRESIDENT PERTINI. THE PRIME MINISTER ALSO SPOKE OF THE TRAGEDY DURING A USEFUL TELEVISION INTERVIEW EARLY ON THE MORNING OF 24 NO VEMBER .

3. IN THE CIRCUMSTANCES. THE WORKING CONTENT OF THE EXCHANGES WAS NECESSARILY LIMITED. AS WAS THE (VERY FAVOURABLE) PRESS COVERAGE IT HAS ATTRACTED. SIGNOR FORLANI'S PRINCIPAL OBJECTIVE WILL HAVE BEEN TO ESTABLISH HIMSELF AS AN EFFECTIVE SUCCESSOR TO SIGNOR COSSIGA AT SUMMIT LEVEL: TO DEMONSTRATE THAT ITALIAN POLICY CON-TINUES TO BE POSITIVE AND CONSTRUCTIVE BOTH IN RELATION TO THE COMMUNITY PROBLEM OF RESTRUCTURING AND IN NATO: AND TO MAKE IT CLEAR THAT, IF THIS IS TO REMAIN THE CASE, ITALY'S ALLIES MUST SHOW UNDERSTANDING OF ITALY'S DELICATE INTERNAL POLITICAL BALANCE AND SEE THAT SHE IS NOT DISREGARDED OR CONSPICIOUSLY LEFT OUT OF SERIOUS CONSULTATIONS AMONG THE MAJOR WESTERN POWERS.

4. YOUR PRINCIPAL TALKS AND THOSE OF THE PRIME MINISTER WERE LARGELY TETE A TETE AND THE RECORDS WILL BE MADE IN LONDON. AT OFFICIAL LEVEL. THERE WAS A VALUABLE OPENING EXCHANGE BETWEEN THE ECONOMIC DIRECTOR (BUCCI) AND FRANKLIN ON RESTRUCTURING (AN EXCHANGE TO BE FOLLOWED BY MORE SUBSTANTIAL DISCUSSIONS IN DECEMBER WHEN THE ITALIANS HOPE TO HAVE REACHED AN AGREED INTER-MINISTERIAL POSITION ON THE SUBJECT): MEANWHILE, THE PUS AND THE MFA'S SECRETARY GENERAL, MALFATTI, CONCENTRATED ON SOME OF THE POLITICAL SUBJECTS LESS LIKELY TO BE TAKEN BY MINISTERS AND HAD A USEFUL REVIEW OF CONFIDENTIAL AFRICAN PROBLEMS.

CONFIDENTIAL

5. I UNDERSTAND THAT THE BREAKFAST WITH PRESIDENT PERTINI WAS CHARACTERISTIC RATHER THAN PRODUCTIVE. THE PRESIDENT IS A MAN OF CONSIDERABLE POLITICAL IMPORTANCE BUT MARKED ECCENTRICITY. IN THE SHIFTING SANDS OF ITALIAN POLITICS, HE EXERTS CONSIDERABLE INFLUENCE ON EVENTS THROUGH HIS PERSONAL STANDING AND WIDE POPULARTY, BUT HE IS ALSO 84 YEARS OLD AND UNPREDICTABLE. BUT HE IS AN ADMIRER OF THE QUEEN AND OF THE PRIME MINISTER AND FRIENDLY TOWARDS US.

6. THIS SERIES OF MEETINGS AT PRIME MINISTERIAL LEVEL DEMON-STRATED ITS VALUE LAST YEAR DURING THE BUDGET NEGOTIATIONS. IT WILL RETAIN ITS IMPORTANCE IN THE FUTURE. GIVEN THE CHANGE IN THE ITALIAN GOVERNMENT, IT WAS ALWAYS LIKELY THAT THIS WOULD BE A RELATIVELY LOW KEY VISIT. BUT I THINK IT SERVED ITS PURPOSE IN BRINGING SIGNOR FORLANI INTO THE PICTURE. THE NEXT ROUND IN LONDON NEXT SPRING SHOULD HAVE WORE MEAT IN IT.

Signor Quagliotti of the Italian Embassy called to see me on Thursday, 20 November, to enquire generally about the Anglo/German Summit; I gave him the text of the Press Conference and expanded on it a little, but not much (because of the traffic generated by the State Opening he was very late and had only fifteen minutes).

2. As Signor Quagliotti left he handed me the attached Press tape, reporting that Signor Sergio Fenoaltea, former Senator and Ambassador in Washington, now a spokesman for the far Right, was calling on Italy to leave NATO and to shut down the US bases if these reports of a Quadripartite Summit at Martinique proved true. Signor Quagliotti was well aware of his Ambassador's exchanges and said that he only wished to reinforce what had been said about the extent to which the 'Quadripartite' question was becoming a live political issue. I showed him Mrs Thatcher's remarks at the Press Conference and said that I had nothing to add.



The Prime Minister's Private Call on The Pope: 10.30

on 24 November

The Prime Minister has arranged to pay a private call on the Pope at 10.30 on 24 November, following her consultations with the Italian Government. I enclose a brief.

I attach a copy of a telegram from our Minister at the Holy See recording a conversation with the Secretary of the Vatican Council for Public Affairs about the agenda for the talk. Obviously the Pope will wish to talk about his visit to the Roman Catholic Community in Great Britain in 1982. He may also talk about his visit to the FRG. But the main subject is likely to be Northern Ireland. The briefing contains a longish background section on Northern Ireland, much of which will already be familiar to the Prime Minister, but we have felt it advisable to include this in view of the Pope's recent message to the Prime Minister about the hunger strike at the Maze Prison, and of the line he took when Her Majesty The Queen called on him last month.

The Pope's views on Poland will, of course, be of particular interest, not least in the light of Cardinal Wyszynski's recent visit to Rome (23 October - 8 November), but he may be reluctant to talk freely about what is for him a very sensitive subject. He may prefer to talk about Polish problems obliquely in a CSCE context, on which he addressed a circular letter to participating Heads of State in early September.

The Pope may ask about European Community developments, in view of the Vatican's interest in promoting the unity of Christian Europe, and about developments in the Middle East. He may seek the Prime Minister's views on the resurgence of CND in Britain.

I attach at Annex a Background Brief on the Vatican's Role and its Foreign Relations.





ANGLO-ITALIAN CONSULTATIONS: 23/24 NOVEMBER: PRIME MINISTER'S BRIEFING MEETING

- 1. The PUS will be attending the Prime Minister's briefing meeting at 0915 tomorrow morning.
- 2. As you know, the visit has now had to be shortened because the Prime Minister has to get back to London for the debate on the address. The present state of play on the revised arrangements is set out in the attached draft telegram which the department has submitted to the Private Office. The main points are that the Prime Minister is now expected to arrive in Rome at 5.00pm on Sunday 23 November and to leave at 11.30 am the following morning after a call on the Pope at 10.30 am. The Italians will probably begin the talks at 1815 on the Sunday evening with three separate tête-â-têtes (Prime Minister/Signor Forlani; Lord Carrington/Signor Colombo; and officials) with the three groups meeting up at about 8.00 pm and Signor Forlani's dinner beginning at 9.00 pm.
- 3. The PUS will have seen Sir R Arculus's scene-setting telegram 612 of 17 November and Sir M Heath's no. 42 of 17 November. He will also wish to note that an addendum to the CSCE Brief has been provided.
- 4. In addition to the exchanges of messages with the Pope referred to in the separate briefing for the Prime Minister's call at the Vatican, there has also been an exchange of messages with the Vatican at official level about the case of Miss McLaughlin. The PUS and the Secretary of State will wish to be aware of this in case Cardinal Casaroli should

raise the issue.

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5. The only issue likely to cause any difficulty on this occasion is the question of a possible repeat of the Guadeloupe meeting. On this the PUS will have seen the separate brief prepared by Planning Staff.

1. Agreement was reached on Friday, 14 November on the agenda and procedures for the Madrid main meeting. The preparatory meeting, which had gone on for almost ten weeks, had failed to reach agreement on these points in the face of Warsaw Pact opposition to adopting the structure which had been employed at the Belgrade review meeting.

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2. The compromise text adopted, while not ideal, effectively preserves the West's interests. It permits the review of implementation to continue until the Christmas break without attention being distracted by discussion of new proposals until the final pre-Christmas week. The East have also agreed, in principle, to another follow-up conference after Madrid.

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ANGLO-ITALIAN CONSULTATIONS: BRIEFS

1. Paragraph 5 of Mr G.alstone's minite of 17 November referred to presentational errors in United contribution to the Anglo/Italian briefing and added that the briefing was late and had to be sent direct to the Cabinet Office.

2. In fact, WED's minute of 3 November commissioning briefs for the consultations requested that all 60 copies of each brief be sent direct to the Cabinet Office by noon on Friday, 14 November, with two side copies to WED. Sixty copies of UND's brief (on Security Council Enlargement) were walked to the Cabinet Office on Thursday morning ie 24 hours before the deadline - with side copies to WED. We have subsequently learnt that WED had telephoned a number of Departments to ask that briefs be routed through them, but they did not make this request to us. WED telephoned this department later on Thursday to point out the three errors in presentation, but we were not requested to recall and amend the briefs. There would in fact have been time for this but we deduced that early distribution of the material and economy in respect of typing and reproduction were being given priority over questions of presentational detail.

I. DATE AND PLACE OF VISIT

The Prime Minister and the Foreign and Commonwealth Secretary, accompanied by those shown at Appendix I will visit Rome on 23 and 24 November 1980.

PROGRAMME

The Programme of the visit as known on I8 November, including the call on the Pope is shown at Appendix II.

TRAVEL 3.

Details are shown in Appendix III, including the details for the Secretary of State's departure to Brussels on 24 November.

4 INSURANCE

(a) Baggage

The insurance of baggage at the expense of HMG is not permissible. In the case of loss of personal baggage, whilst travelling or in receipt of subsistence allowance, claims may be submitted up to a maximum of £200 (no one article to exceed £50), provided that the loss is not covered by an existing policy.

Personal (b)

Those travelling in the HS I25s are advised to check whether their insurance policies provide cover for travel by non-commercial flights and to consult their insurers if they are in any doubt about their position. At present, claims on HMG for compensation are subject to a liability limit of £25,000.

5. BAGGAGE

Baggage labels are enclosed for those travelling on the HS I25s in the following colours :-

(b) Since the luggage space on board the HS I25 aircraft is very limited, members of the party are asked to carry as small a suitcase or grip as possible.

(c) The free baggage allowance on economy class commercial flights is 20 kilos and on first class flights is 30 kilos.

6. PASSPORTS AND HEALTH

Each person travelling should have a valid passport. There are no visa or health requirements for Italy.

7. LIVING ACCOMMODATION

Details are shown at Appendix I.

8. WORKING ACCOMMODATION

A Private Office for both the Prime Minister and the Foreign and Commonwealth Secretary will be set up at the Villa Wolkonsky. There will also be offices available in the Chancery Building.

9. OFFICE EQUIPMENT AND STATIONERY

- (a) Office equipment including typewriters and photocopiers will be provided in the Private Office in the British Embassy in Rome.
- (b) Secretarial Assistants will take a portable typewriter and any necessary stationery with them to Rome.
- (c) Common user stationery will be provided by the Embassy.

IO. STAFF SUPPORT FROM HM EMBASSY, ROME

A member of Information Section will assist Mr Ingham with Press liaison. Secretarial assistance will be provided as required.

II. TELEGRAMS

The Embassy will maintain a 24 hour cypher watch from the time the Prime Minister and party leave London on 23 November until their departure the following day. All telegrams for the Prime Minister or the Foreign and Commonwealth Secretary and party should bear the prefix 'following for 'from ...'.

Distribution in Rome

Telegrams specifically addressed to the Prime Minister or Foreign and Commonwealth Secretary's party should not be copied and circulated within the Embassy. Only those Embassy series telegrams which are relevant to the visit of the Prime Minister and Foreign and Commonwealth Secretary should be copied to the party.

12. TELEPHONES

(a) The Embassy switchboard will be operated on a 24 hours a day basis throughout the visit.

RESTRICTED

- (b) There will be direct lines between the Embassy switchboard and the Private Office at Villa Wolkonsky with extensions to the bedrooms of the Private Secretaries of both the Prime Minister and the Foreign and Commonwealth Secretary. It will be possible for the Private Secretaries to switch calls through to the Prime Minister and the Secretary of State and to listen in.

I3. SECURITY

- (a) The Special Couriers for the round trip will be Miss Hatt and Miss Pearey. Members of the party carrying classified documents in their briefcases are asked to contact Mr Chapman, Communications Operations Department, FCO (tel 233 3706).
- (b) HM Embassy, Rome will provide combination lock cupboards for the Private Office at the Villa Wolkonsky.
- (c) The Private Office at Villa Wolkonsky will be under guard during the night of 23-24 November and any other time when classified material has been deposited there.
- (d) The Embassy will operate safe-hand service from the Chancery to wherever the Private Secretaries both to the Prime Minister and to the Foreign and Commonwealth Secretary happen to be. The first of these will be timed to arrive at the Villa Wolkonsky and at the Hotel Delta for Mr Ingham by 0730 hours on 24 November.
- (e) A security brief for Rome is enclosed for members of the delegation.
- 14. TRANSPORT IN ROME

The COI summary will be sent to the Embassy to reach the party at the Villa Wolkonsky early on the morning of 24 November. Copies will also be sent to Mr Ingham at the Hotel Delta.

16. FINANCE

- (a) Costs will be borne by parent departments. Common service cost will be charged to the Civil Service Department.

- (c) Subsistence
- (i) Subsistence will be issued on arrival in Rome by HM Embassy based on the following rates:-

- 1. I hope that Mr Wright will not find it necessary to write to you about errors in the presentation of the briefs for the Anglo-Italian Consultations. Inevitably, however, there were some and you may like to have advance warning of them.
- Several of the briefs were given less than the prescribed 1 1/2 inch margin. This deviation from the norm tends to creep in at the reproduction stage if departments do not exercise close enough control over it. As soon as we noticed it, we checked with the Cabinet Office who assured us that briefs need not be re-done on that account.
- In addition there are one or two tiny errors that I do not think even Mr Wright will write to you about, e g underlining both the heading and the title of the ECD(I) briefs, and (in the same briefs) the date at the beginning in capitals instead of lower case. We were in close touch with ECD(I) about errors in their briefs on Friday, but the final version had to be produced so late that we could not excize these remaining errors.
- Copies of other Departments' briefs sent to us after the deadline also contained errors (MAFF, Treasury, DOT and Department of Energy). The Cabinet Office should clearly write to them and not to us about these.
- UN Department's brief had a covering sheet rather than continuing straight on from the heading; less than the correct margin; and 'Foreign and Commonwealth Office' at the end in capitals. The brief was produced late and had to be sent direct to the Cabinet Office.
- 6. In the case of the briefs which were delivered to us on time, there were a number of other errors, notwithstanding my Assistant's prior reminder to briefing departments, which we picked up and had corrected before passing the briefs to the Cabinet Office. In the case of even the tiniest of these errors, Mr Vereker is minuting his opposite numbers in the departments concerned asking them to eliminate them in the future. Needless to say, all this nit-picking takes up a considerable amount of WED's time. The only sure way

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of resolving the problem would be for this department to type all the briefs but for operational reasons that would be neither possible nor desirable.

 - (A) IRAN/IRAQ GROMYKO STATED THAT AT PRESENT THE SOVIET UNION WAS SUPPLYING ARMS TO NEITHER PARTY. HE ALSO REFERRED TO DISINFORMATION ON THIS SUBJECT IN THE WEST - '.WI KNOW WHERE IT COMES FROM' ': AND
 - MENGISTU'S VISIT (R) GROMYKO SAID THAT MENGISTU HAD BEEN VERY CRITICAL ABOUT SOMAL! POLICY. THE SOVIET UNION AGREED WITH HIM ON THE SUBJECT OF US BASES IN SOMALIA. THE SOVIET UNION HAD BEEN ACCUSED OF HAVING A BASE ON BERBERA. NOW EVERYONE ACCEPTED THE PRESENCE OF US BASES THERE AND CRITICIZED THE RUSSIANS OVER AFGHANISTAN.
- 3. THERE WERE ALSO SOME ADDITIONAL DETAILS OF COLOMBO'S MEETING WITH BREZHNEY, PARTICULARLY ON THE SUBJECT OF THE BREZHNEY ARGUED THAT THE SOVIET UNION HAD REPLACED ANALOGOUS WEAPONS SYSTEMS. OTHERS, WHICH HAD NOT PREVIOUSLY HAD SUCH WEAPONS, WERE NOW UPSETTING THE BALANCE BY INSTALLING THEM. PROGRESS IN THE TALKS IN GEMEVA NOW HAD TO AWAIT REAGAN, BUT THEY MUST INCLUDE FBS. ALL EUROPE MUST BE INTERESTED IN THE PROGRESS OF THSE TALKS AND HE HOPED THAT ITALY TOOK A RESPONSIBLE ATTITUDE. WHY HAD SOME COUNTRIES ACCEPTED MISSILES WITHOUT WEIGHING THE CONSEQUENCES? SOVIET POLICY WAS TO RAISE THE LIVING STANDARDS OF THE SOVIET PEOPLE. THIS WAS THE AXIS OF THEIR POLICY, INCLUDING FOREIGN POLICY. THE CENTRAL COMMITTEE HAD PREPARED PLANS ON THE BASE OF DETENTE. DISARMAMENT AND COLLABORATION. IN REPLY COLOMBO SUGGESTED THAT THE BALANCE OF FORCES SHOULD BE AT THE LOWEST POSSIBLE LEVEL, AND ACCUSED THE SOVIET UNION OF CAUSING DISEQUILIBRIUM WITH THE SSZØ.
- 4. AT ONE POINT COLOMBO MENTIONED NORTH/SOUTH PROBLEMS, EXPRESSING THE HOPE THAT THE SOVIET UNION WOULD CO-OPERATE, BREZENEV FALLED TO UNDERSTAND AND THOUGHT THAT COLOMBO WAS REFERRING TO SOUTH ITALY, GROMYKO INTERVENED TO EXPLAIN THE BACKGROUND AND THE UN CONFERENCE. IN AN ASIDE TO GROMYKO, BREZENEV SAID JOKINGLY THAT HE HAD DONE A BAD JOB AT THE UN. GROMYKO REPLIED BY POINTING OUT THAT HE HAD NOT BEEN THERE AND HAD NOT THOUGHT IT IMPORTANT.

STEERING BRIEF

Brief by Foreign and Commonwealth Office

INTRODUCTION

Mrs Thatcher is to visit Rome for official talks at former Prime Minister Cossiga's invitation on 23/24 November. The talks have been timed to take place shortly before the European Council meeting on 1/2 December. It was agreed last October that Anglo-Italian bilateral talks should be held twice a year. The last in this series was held in London on 29/30 January, though Signor Cossiga also visited London on Community business in April. This will be Mrs Thatcher's first meeting with the new Prime Minister, whose four party coalition was speedily put together last month. Signor Forlani's government has a comfortable majority on paper but internal differences are already apparent. Because of this and through natural inclination, Signor Forlani who is an adroit politician, may be preoccupied with the management of internal affairs rather than external policy. He may therefore lean on the capable

UNITED KINGDOM OBJECTIVES

- 2. (a) Following the success of the State Visit, to establish good working relations between the Prime Minister and the Italian Prime Minister, in particular by showing that we take seriously Italian views on major current international issues.
 - (b) To discuss Community issues in preparation for the next European Council meeting (on 1-2 December); and to exchange views on restructuring the Community budget within the 1% ceiling, including the reform of the CAP.
 - (c) To discuss and so far as possible agree on the implications of the result of the United States elections for Transatlantic and East-West relations.

PROBABLE ITALIAN OBJECTIVES

- (a) To consolidate the institution of regular biannual Anglo-Italian Summit meetings and to establish a good working relationship with the Prime Minister.
 - (b) To try to ensure that Italy is no longer excluded from any consultations on matters of international importance between the major Western Powers, particularly if they are public knowledge.
 - (c) To compare notes on the probable policies and attitudes of the new United States Administration.

- (d) To concert policy on current world political issues and in particular to review British and Italian views on the Middle East in the light of the Iran/Iraqi war, and on East-West relations in the light of developments in Afghanistan and Poland.
- (e) To elicit British thinking on European Community enlargement and restructuring.
- (f) To exchange views on world economic issues and in particular Western policy towards the developing world.

STRATEGY AND TACTICS

4. Signor Forlani's English is not good enough to allow him to forego interpretation. This will restrict the amount of business which can be done in the time available. At the tête-à-tête, the Prime Minister may wish to begin by referring to the great success of The Queen's State Visit to Italy in October, and proceed to emphasise the importance we attach to Italian views on the international scene by seeking Signor Forlani's views on the results of the American election. This could lead on to discussion of the situation in Poland, but this part of the discussion will need to be kept short if adequate time is to be left for discussion of the European Community matters which are of importance to us. Under this heading the Prime Minister will wish to initiate the Anglo-Italian dialogue on restructuring. For tactical

reasons this subject can best be placed in the context of the resolution of the budget problem for which the Italian Presidency bore much responsibility. She could also mention to Signor Forlani the points she will wish to discuss at the European Council on 1/2 December.

BRIEF NO. 3: Middle East

10. (a) Iran/Iraq and the Gulf

(b) Arab/Israel

The European Council on 1 December will need to decide on future activity by the Nine in the light of the detailed papers prepared at official level.

There is likely to be a period of uncertainty in the aftermath of the US elections during which a major new European initiative would not be helpful. But it is Amportant for the Nine to continue to be active.

BREIF NO 4: European Community Questions

11. On this, the Prime Minister may wish to have a first discussion on restructuring and the reform of the CAP with a view to identifying common ground. This can usefully be placed within the context of the Italian Presidency's help in achieving the 30 May Budget settlement. It would be useful to have a first exchange on 1981 CAP prices. The Prime Minister might/also, mention the points she will wish to discuss at the European Council.

BRIEF NO 5: East-West Relations (including Poland, China and CSCE

12. The Russians seem to have assessed before the

BRIEF NO 7: Defence and Disarmament Questions (including CDE)

14. This addresses the implications for the Alliance of the growing strategic importance of the Gulf area and the need for NATO to make more effective use of its resources.

The calso covers the modernisation of NATO's TNF, the future of SALT and other arms control negotiations, particularly in the light of Governor Reagan's victory.

BRIEF NO 8: International Economic and Financial Questions 15. GNP is falling or at best static in all main economies, and inflation has passed its peak in most. The downturn has been more generalised than once expected, and next year's recovery will probably be slow. / Italians generally seek to appear as forthcoming as possible towards developing country demands. Our concern that Global Negotiations Procedures should not compromise autonomy of IMF not shared by Italy. Italy is anxious for an invitation to the 1981 limited North/South Summit: we feel such a Summit would be useful if well prepared and have indicated that we would accept an invitation. Others, such as French and Germans favour a very informal and unstructured meeting. HMG remains committed to an open world trading system. We go along with Community policy towards Japan, but need to make sure that UK interests in certain sensitive sectors are preserved.

16. On energy, we must keep in close touch with the Italians over the impact of Iran/Iraqi War. The Italians may point out that there has been some nervousness reflected recently in the rise in spot#markdprices. We agree that further action may be needed in the IEA. Consideration of energy issues in other international contexts is proceeding smoothly.

BRIEF NO 10: Regional Questions (including Italy-Malta and Italy-North Africa)

17. If the matter is raised, the Prime Minister may wish to congratulate the Italians on their recent conclusion of a Neutrality Agreement with Malta; but to express the hope that the associated aid will not help Mr Mintoff to win the next election.

18. We have taken a firm line on Libyan terrorism. We would like the Italians to take a similar line.

BRIEF NO 11: Bilateral Questions

19. (a) Anglo-Italian Trade

This has shown a steady increase in both directions for several years. Until last year Italian exports to the UK increased at a greater rate than British exports to Italy. This year the trend has been reversed: the value of British exports increased by 33% whereas Italian exports only rose by 6%.

(b) Gooperation on combatting terrorism

HMG values cooperation with the Italians on SAS have already supplied assistance and would be happy to provide further advice. We currently await Italian views on Italy's proposed amendments to the Anglo-Italian Extradition Treaty. A suspected Italian terrorist, Mario Ferrandi, was arrested in London on 29 October. We await a formal application for his extradition.

1. I CALLED THIS MORNING ON MONSIGNOR SILVESTRINI, SECRETARY OF
THE COUNCIL FOR THE PUBLIC AFFAIRS OF THE CHURCH. I ASKED FOR
THE APPOINTMENT LAST WEEK IN ORDER TO DISCUSS CARDINAL WYSZYNSKI'S
VISIT AND THE CHURCH IN POLAND. (YOUR TELNO 34). I TOOK THE OPPORTUNITY FOR A WIDER DISCUSSION OF THE CURRENT POLITICAL SCENE AND
OF THE TOPICS WHICH THE VATICAN ARE MOST LIKELY TO DISCUSS.

2. ON POLAND MGR. SILVESTRINI EXPRESSED HIS INTEREST IN THE ACCOUNT OF YOUR VISIT TO WARSAW LAST MONTH. HE AGREED THAT THE POSITION REMAINED DELICATE. THE VATICAN WERE GIVING DISCREET SUPPORT TO THE AUTHORITIES IN ORDER TO PROTECT THE INTERESTS OF THEIR OWN PEOPLE, THEY SHARED YOUR ASSESSMENT OF THE IMPORTANCE OF THE ECONOMIC BACKGROUND. THE POLES FACED A HEAVY TASK IF THEY WERE TO COVER THEIR FINANCIAL COMMITMENTS. HE THOUGHT THAT HELP FROM THE WEST WOULD BE IMPORTANT.

3. MGR. SILVESTRINI SAID LITTLE ABOUT THE VISIT OF CARDINAL WYSZYNSKI EXCEPT TO REFER TO THE PODE'S PUBLIC STATEMENTS. THEY WANTED REPHASING OF THEIR DEBTS FOR 1981 TO 1983 AND ADDITIONAL CREDITS MEANWHILE. HE HAD TOLD GROWNKO THAT ITALY WOULD HELP POLAND IF ASKED BUT THIS WAS NOT AN INTERVENTION IN POLAND'S INTERNAL AFFAIRS.
- 4. HE WOULD ALSO BE GLAD TO GIVE HIS IMPRESSIONS OF MADRID. HE THOUGHT IT WAS WORTH WHILE HAVING GONE. WE MUST MAKE IT DIFF-ICULT FOR THE RUSSIANS TO PUT ANY BLAME ON THE WESTERN CAMP.
- 5. HE GAVE ME A LECTURE ABOUT NOT EXCLUDING ITALY, FROM ANY FUTURE GUADELOUP—TYPE CONFERENCE. I REPLIED IN THE SAME YERMS AS YOU DID TO THE RECENT REPRESENTATIONS OF AMBASSADOR CAGIATI IN LONDON. COLOMBO REPLIED HOWEVER THAT THERE WAS SOMETHING IN THE RUMOURS. HE SAID, IN LANGUAGE THAT WAS STRONG FOR HIM, THAT ITALY DID MOT WANT ANY MORE OF THIS. PRIME MINISTER'S VISIT TO ITALY.

1. THE PRIME MINISTER AND YOURSELF ARE DUE HERE ON 23 NOVEMBER. YOU MAY WISH TO HAVE AN ASSESSMENT OF THE PRESENT POSITION OF THE ITALIAN GOVERNMENT AND THE NEW PRIME MINISTER. SIGNOR FORLANI.

FORLANI IS PREOCCUPIED WITH INTERNAL DIFFICULTIES. THE FORMATION OF HIS ENLARGED COALITION ENDED A GOVERNMENT CRISIS BUT DID NOT SOLVE THE PROBLEMS OF GOVERNING ITALY. NOR DID IT CHANGE IN ANY IMPORTANT RESPECT, ITALIAN FOREIGN POLICY. ITALIAN GOVERNMENTS COME AND GO WITH DISTRESSING FREQUENCY, BUT ITALY'S FRIENDS AND ALLIES CAN NEVERTHELESS RELY ON A FAIR DEGREE OF CONTINUITY IN POLICY. THIS TIME THERE IS THE ADDED REASSURANCE THAT COLOMBO AND THE MINISTER OF DEFENCE, LAGORIO, REMAIN IN OFFICE.

3. FORLANI'S PROSPECTS ARE NOT PARTICULARLY GOOD, EVEN MEASURED BY THE SHORT LIFE EXPECTANCY (8 MONTHS ON AVERAGE) OF POST-WAR ITALIAN GOVERNMENTS. BUT HE HAS SOME ASSETS, AND THERE IS A WIDESPREAD VIEW THAT HE IS BETTER PLACED POLITICALLY THAN WAS COSSIGA. PICCOLL. THE PARTY SECRETARY, IS WORKING HARD TO UNITE THE DC BEHIND HIM. FORLANI IS TRUSTED BY THE RIGHT BUT IS EXPECTED ALSO TO MAINTAIN SOME FORM OF DIALOGUE WITH THE COMMUNISTS, WITHOUT ENVISAGING THEIR ENTRY INTO GOVERNMENT. HE HAS ALSO TO KEEP THE SOCIALISTS IN THE COALITION WITHOUT CONCEDING TOO MUCH TO THEIR LEADER, CRAXI. THIS SORT OF PARTY MANAGEMENT IS MEAT AND DRINK TO FORLANI AS TO MOST CHRISTIAN DEMOCRAT AND OTHER ITALIAN POLITICIANS. BUT IT DOES LEAVE HIM WITH LESS TIME FOR INTERNATIONAL PROBLEMS OR MACRO ECONOMICS.

4. HE HAS RUN QUICKLY INTO RATHER SERIOUS DOMESTIC WORRIES, INCLUDING A MAJOR FINANCIAL SCOFDAL OVER A DIESEL OIL TAX FRAUD WHICH CONTINUES TO MAKE HEADLINES. THE SUMS OF MONEY SAID TO BE INVOLVED ARE HUGE AND THOUGH NOTHING HAS BEEN PROVED, IT SEEMS LIKELY TO CONFIRM THE PUBLIC'S DEEP CONVICTION THAT THEIR POLITICAL SYSTEM IS CORRUPT. AS YET IT POSES NO THREAT TO FORLANI COMPARABLE TO THE DONAT CATTIN AFFAIR WHICH BEGAN COSSIGA'S DOWNFALL. BUT AS THE RAMIFICATIONS OF THE FRAUD AND SUBSEQUENT ATTEMPTS TO COVER IT UP ARE REVEALED (INCLUDING EVEN ALLEGATIONS THAT FORLAND HIMSELF AS MINISTER OF DEFENCE IN 1975 WAS INVOLVED), FORLANI IS LARGELY PREOCCUPIED WITH IT.

5. MEASURES HAVE BEEN TAKEN TO DEAL WITH IMMEDIATE ECONOMIC PROBLEMS (MY SAVING TELMO 41, NOT TO UKDEL NATO), BUT THE COVERNMENT IS DUE TO PRESENT ITS 3—YEAR STRATEGY BY THE END OF THE YEAR, AND THERE ARE ALREADY TENSIONS BETWEEN THE SOCIALISTS AND THE OTHER PARTIES IN THE GOVERNMENT. WITH THE RECESSION NOW BEGINNING TO HAVE ITS EFFECT HERE, THE WINTER WILL BE DIFFICULT. BUT THE GOVERNMENT HAS THE ADVANTAGE THAT THE MAJOR DISPUTE AT FIAT HAS BEEN SETTLED IN WHAT IS GENERALLY REGARDED AS A VICTORY FOR MANAGEMENT OVER THE UNIONS, AND THE LATTER MAY BE MORE CAUTIOUS IN FZKYURE CONFRWATATIONS.

6. AGAINST THIS BACKGROUND, FORLANI WILL BE LOOKING AT FOREIGN POLICY ISSUES WITH ONE EYE ALWAYS ON THEIR DOMESTIC REPERCUSSIONS. HE WILL BE AS SENSITIVE AS HIS PREDECESSORS TO ANY SUGGESTION THAT ITALY IS BEING LEFT OUT OF GREAT POWER CONSULTATIONS (ESPECIALLY IN THE LIGHT OF REPORTS OF THE GISCARD/SCHMIDT MEETING). ON COMMUNITY POLICIES, THE ITALIANS HAVE NOT YET WORKED OUT THEIR IDEAS ON RESTRUCTURING BUT WILL LOOK FOR MEASURES THAT CAN PROMOTE CONVERGENCE AND MEET THE NEEDS OF MEDITERRANEAN PRODUCERS. THEY WILL CONTINUE TO BE FUNDAMENTALLY COMMITTED TO MAKING THE COMMUNITY WORK, AND RECOGNISE THAT THIS MEANS THAT IT HAS TO SERVE THE INTERESTS OF ALL ITS MEMBERS INCLUDING THE U.K. ON EAST/WEST RELATIONS COLOMBO WILL BE FRESH FROM HIS VISITS TO MD SCOW, WARSAW AND MADRID. THE ITAL! AND HAVE BEEN ROBUST OVER THE AND THE LINE TO TAKE AT MADRID, BUT FORLANI HAS TO TAKE ACCOUNT OF THE ATTITUDE OF THE COMMUNIST PARTY WHO WANT CONSULTATION ON THIS AND OTHER ASPECTS OF FOREIGN POLICY AS FART OF THEIR PRICE FOR LESS VEHEMENT OPPOSITION.

7. I CANNOT SAY WHETHER THE PRIME MINISTER WILL FIND FORLANI AS SATISFACTORY AN INTERLOCUTOR AS HIS PREDECESSOR. BUT OUR SHARED INTERESTS WITH ITALY ON THE ISSUES OF THE DAY ARE NO LESS THAN BEFORE. ITALIAN POLICY HAS SHOWN A DEGREE OF CONSISTENCY OVER THE YEARS AND IF THE PRIME MINISTER CAN ESTABLISH A WORKING RELATIONSHIP WITH FORLANI THIS, TOGETHER WITH YOUR UNDERSTANDING WITH COLOMBO, WILL STAND US IN GOOD STEAD AT THE EUROPEAN COUNCIL AND ELSEWHERE. THE ITALIANS WILL TRY TO HELP US WHEN THEY CAN, PROVIDED THAT WHAT WE WANT IS NOT DIAMETRICALLY OPPOSED TO THEIR INTERESTS. RUGGIERO IN BRUSSELS SHOULD BE A USEFUL ALLY WHENEVER WE CAN WORK TOGETHER.



STEERING BRIEF

Brief by Foreign and Commonwealth Office

INTRODUCTION

Mrs Thatcher is to visit Rome for official talks at former Prime Minister Cossiga's invitation on 23/24 The talks have been timed to take place shortly before the European Council meeting on 1/2 December. It was agreed last October that Anglo-Italian bilateral talks should be held twice a year. The last in this series was held in London on 29/30 January, though Signor Cossiga also visited London on Community business in April. This will be Mrs Thatcher's first meeting with the new Prime Minister, whose four party coalition was speedily put together last month. Signor Forlani's government has a comfortable majority on paper but internal differences are already apparent. Because of this and through natural inclination, Signor Forlani who is an adroit politician, may be preoccupied with the management of internal affairs rather than external policy. He may therefore lean on the capable Signor Colombo.

/UNITED KINGDOM

UNITED KINGDOM OBJECTIVES

- 2. (a) Following the success of the State Visit, to establish good working relations between the Prime Minister and the Italian Prime Minister, in particular by showing that we take seriously Italian views on major current international issues.
 - (b) To discuss Community issues in preparation for the next European Council meeting (on 1-2 December); and to exchange views on restructuring the Community budget within the 1% ceiling, including the reform of the CAP.
 - (c) To discuss and so far as possible agree on the implications of the result of the United States elections for Transatlantic and East-West relations.

PROBABLE ITALIAN OBJECTIVES

- 3. (a) To consolidate the institution of regular biannual Anglo-Italian Summit meetings and to establish a good working relationship with the Prime Minister.
 - (b) To try to ensure that Italy is no longer excluded from any consultations on matters of international importance between the major Western Powers, particularly if they are public knowledge.
 - (c) To compare notes on the probable policies and attitudes of the new United States Administration

- (d) To concert policy on current world political issues and in particular to review British and Italian views on the Middle East in the light of the Iran/Iraqi war, and on East-West relations in the light of developments in Afghanistan and Poland.
- (e) To elicit British thinking on European

 Community enlargement and restructuring.
- (f) To exchange views on world economic issues and in particular Western policy towards the developing world.

STRATEGY AND TACTICS

4. Signor Forlani's English is not good enough to allow him to forego interpretation. This will restrict the amount of business which can be done in the time available. At the tête-à-tête, the Prime Minister may wish to begin by referring to the great success of The Queen's State Visit to Italy in October, and proceed to emphasise the importance we attach to Italian views on the international scene by seeking Signor Forlani's views on the results of the American election. This could lead on to discussion of the situation in Poland, but this part of the discussion will need to be kept short if adequate time is to be left for discussion of the European Community matters which are of importance to us. Under this heading the Prime Minister will wish to initiate the Anglo-Italian dialogue on restructuring. For tactical

/reasons

reasons this subject can best be placed in the context of the resolution of the budget problem for which the Italian Presidency bore much responsibility. She could also mention to Signor Forlani the points she will wish to discuss at the European Council on 1/2 December.

- The Italians are anxious to be seen to play a significant role in international affairs, and will probably raise the question of consultations which exclude them (Brief No. 11 Signor Colombo expressed his concern to Lord Carrington during the State Visit). particular they may raise again, following the Giscard/ Schmidt talks, their fears over the development as they see it of a Franco-German Axis. (President Giscard is to visit Italy on 27 November.) The Italians argue that we share with them an interest in ensuring that European decisions are taken by the Community as a whole, or failing that, by a group including Italy and This is for them a matter of cardinal the UK. importance.
- 6. The Foreign and Commonwealth Secretary will be having a simultaneous discussion tête-â-tête with the Italian Foreign Minister, Signor Colombo, at which we have proposed to the Italians that the Middle East and Regional Questions should be covered, together with Signor Colombo's recent visit to Moscow. Discussion of international issues (including the EC) and of the remaining agenda items can continue at the Plenary Session.

PROGRAMME

The Prime Minister is due to arrive in Rome at 1830 on Sunday 23 November in time for a tête-à-tête discussion with Signor Forlani. Lord Carrington is expected to have a separate tête-à-tête with Signor Colombo, after which the two Foreign Ministers may join the Prime Minister. The Embassy in Rome have not been able to extract a firm programme from the Italians, but it is expected that these meetings will be followed by an informal dinner, probably given by Signor Forlani, to include the two Prime Ministers and the two Foreign Ministers. On the following morning there is likely to be a Plenary Session which will probably be attended on the Italian side by Signor Forlani, Signor Colombo (Foreign Minister), Signor Malfatti (Secretary General of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs), Signor Berlinguer (Signor Forlani's Diplomatic Adviser), Signor Vanni d'Archirafi (Chief Adviser to the Foreign Minister), the Italian Ambassador, Signor Cagiati, and probably 3 or 4 officials, including Signor Walter Gardini (Political Director). The Prime Minister will be supported by Lord Carrington, Sir Michael Palliser, Sir Ronald Arculus, Mr Franklin, and Private Secretaries. Signor Forlani will probably give a working lunch for the two delegations. There will probably be a joint press conference just before lunch. The Prime Minister is to

BRIEF NO. 2: United States Policies following the Presidential Election

9. Difficult to predict President-efect Reagan's policies before we know who will be appointed to the Cabinet and the White House staff. Mr Reagan's campaign statements sounded hawkish and confrontational, but his policies have not been spelt out in detail and their implementation may be moderated if such figures as Dr Kissinger and Senator Henry Jackson play a rôle in the Administration.

BRIEF NO. 3: Middle East

10. (a) Iran/Iraq and the Gulf

The state of play and implications of the Gulf are for shipping, oil supplies, Western interests. Question of Europe's rôle. Considerations to be taken into account if the hostages are released, including possible resumption of arms supplies.

(b) Arab/Israel

The European Council on 1 December will need to decide on future activity by the Nine in the light of the detailed papers prepared at official level. There-is likely to be a period of uncertainty in the aftermath of the US elections during which a major new European initiative would not be helpful. But it is Important for the Nine to continue to be active.

BREIF NO 4: European Community Questions

11. On this, The Prime Minister may wish to have a first discussion on restructuring and the reform of the CAP with a view to identifying common ground. This can usefully be placed within the context of the Italian Presidency's help in achieving the 30 May Budget settlement. It—would be useful to have a first exchange on 1981 CAP prices. The Prime Minister might Also, mention the points she will wish to discuss at the European Council.

BRIEF NO 5: East-West Relations (including Poland, China and CSCE

12. The Russians seem to have assessed before the Presidential election that a more difficult period in USSoviet relations had begun, but they will be cautious about concluding that Mr Reagan's victory will necessarily lead to a worsening of bilateral relations. The Prime Minister may wish to give our impression of the Polish situation and to seek details of any Polish approach to the Italians for economic assistance, and the Italian Government's reaction.

The Prime Minister may like to say that Recent internal developments indicate that China continues to follow

pragmatic policies and that the prospects appear to be for political stability and economic growth.

BRIEF NO 6: Afghanistan/Pakistan

13. It is necessary to maintain international pressure on the Russians. Support for Pakistan remains crucial. They want more economic assistance.

BRIEF NO 7: Defence and Disarmament Questions (including CDE 14. This addresses the implications for the Alliance of the growing strategic importance of the Gulf area and the need for NATO to make more effective use of its resources. The Calso covers the modernisation of NATO's TNF, the future of SALT and other arms control negotiations, particularly in the light of Governor Reagan's victory.

BRIEF NO 8: International Economic and Financial Questions 15. GNP is falling or at best static in all main economies. and inflation has passed its peak in most. The downturn has been more generalised than once expected, and nextyear's recovery will probably be slow. / Italians generally seek to appear as forthcoming as possible towards developing country demands. Our concern that Global Negotiations Procedures should not compromise autonomy of IMF not shared by Italy. Italy is anxious for an invitation to the 1981 limited North/South Summit: we feel such a Summit would be useful if well prepared and have indicated that we would accept an invitation. Others, such as French and Germans favour a very informal and unstructured meeting. BRIEF NO 9: International Energy Questions

16. On energy, We must keep in close touch with the Itlians over the impact of Iran/Iraqi War. The Italians may point out that there has been some nervousness reflected recently in the rise in spotwmark/prices. We agree that further action may be needed in the IEA. Consideration of energy issues in other international contexts is proceeding smoothly.

BRIEF NO 10: Regional Questions (including Italy-Malta and Italy-North Africa)

17. If the matter is raised, the Prime Minister may wish to congratulate the Italians on their recent conclusion of a Neutrality Agreement with Malta; but to express the hope that the associated aid will not help Mr Mintoff to win the next election.

18. We have taken a firm line on Libyan terrorism. We would like the Italians to take a similar line.

BRIEF NO 11: Bilateral Questions

19. (a) Anglo-Italian Trade

This has shown a steady increase in both directions for several years. Until last year Italian exports to the UK increased at a greater rate than British exports to Italy. This year the trend has been reversed: the value of British exports increased by 33% whereas Italian exports only rose by 6%.

(b) Cooperation on combatting terrorism

HMG values cooperation with the Italians on terrorism: the SAD have already supplied assistance and would be happy to provide further advice. We currently await Italian views on Italy's proposed amendments to the Anglo-Italian Extradition Treaty. A suspected Italian terrorist, Mario Ferrandi, was arrested in London on 29 October. We await a formal application for his extradition.

(c) Consultations

A Defensive Brief has been submitted separately.

BRIEF NO 12: Italian Political and Economic Scene

20. Signor Forlani's newly formed government has a comfortable majority on paper but internal defences are apparent. Italy is suffering from the effects of the world economic recession.

- WRJ 397/1 I was most interested to read your despatch on The Queen's visit. Its success is merely one of a number of straws pointing in the same direction which suggest that there could be advantage in trying to thicken up and exploit our relationship with the Vatican. The telegram which we sent you on 6 November about the Church in Poland is perhaps the most obvious area and your contacts, from the Cardinal Secretary of State downwards, might throw useful light on the evolving situation in Poland at a moment of crucial importance to the West. The complex of subjects relating to Ireland is another obvious area on which I hope that you feel that you receive adequate background briefing material. are other areas, too, such as Latin America where the Papal administration may have useful things to say. In short, this letter is meant as encouragement to you to err on the side of generosity for an experimental period of, say, 6 months, in your reporting on Vatican assessments and in your input on UK policies.
 - For my part I am breaking my duck and giving Archbishop Heim lunch next Tuesday!
 - As a spur to your efforts may I make a specific request that you have an exchange of views on political subjects in time for what you elicit to be taken account of in the briefing for the Prime Minister's call on 25 November.



Anglo-German Consultations: Briefs

In my Private Secretary letter PS(80) 25 of 3rd November, I listed the briefs needed for these talks and gave details of the format. All the FCO and Treasury briefs arrived on time and I am grateful for this, particularly in view of the relatively short time allowed for preparation.

You may have noticed that the details on the format of the briefs contained Annexes C and D of my letter were more explicit than has been the case in the past. This was done in an effort to ensure that, in contrast to previous briefing operations, all those preparing briefs scrupulously observed the layout instructions. This has been partially effective in that there seem to have been less errors of format and layout on this occasion than previously. It was not, however, entirely successful as the following details reveal:

- ECDIO
- (a) In Briefs 2(a) and 2(b) the words "Brief by the Foreign and Commonwealth Office" were omitted and in Brief 3(c) it was included in capitals and not lower case.
- (b) In Briefs 3(b) and 9, the rubric "THIS DOCUMENT IS THE PROPERTY OF etc...." was omitted.
- (c) The symbol at the top lefthand corner of the brief was incorrect in Briefs 2(b), 4 and 10.
- (d) The heading of Brief 8(a) read incorrectly Anglo-German Consultations (Including in UK and FRG).

These are, I know, small points which do not affect the substance of the briefs. But there is no reason why some brief drafters should fail to observe details which the majority succeed in observing. Furthermore, and more importantly, mistakes which are noticed when the briefs reach

here have to be rectified and corrigenda issued. This means more typing and distribution costs. I should, therefore, be grateful if you could remind those concerned with the above briefs of the need to pay greater care and attention to the details of the format in future, particularly if they are drafting the briefs for the Anglo-Italian Consultations, which are due to reach us on Friday, 14th November.

In 1979 Italy was the UK's ninth-largest export market and, in turn, the UK provided the third-largest market for Italian goods. UK exports/were valued at £1.5 billion in 1979 and £1.4 billion in the first 9 months of 1980. However, the UK had a trade deficit of £1030 million in 1979 and £337 million in the first 9 months of 1980. Our trade performance with Italy has deteriorated through the 1970s; exports covered 98% of imports in 1970 and only 59% in 1979. During the first 9 months of 1980 this coverage has improved to 81%, mainly as a result of improvements on the oil account. The main components in trade between the two countries are manufactured goods and machinery in particular. 1. We propose, with your approval, that the Prime Minister should travel to Rome in an RAF HS 125 on Sunday 23 November. The flying time to Rome is 2 hours 45 minutes, and Italy is one hour ahead of the United Kingdom, so if we want the Prime Minister to arrive at 1800 hours local, the Prime Minister's aircraft would need to take-off from RAF Northolt at 1415 hours local time. The return journey would be fitted in after the Prime Minister calls on the Pope. If the aircraft were to take-off from Rome before 1815 hours local it would return to RAF Northolt, but if take-off is after that time, the aircraft will have to return to London Heathrow.

2. It is proposed that the Foreign and Commonwealth Secretary should depart RAF Northolt at the same time, but subject to your views, would travel in a separate HS 125 as he will either be flying on to Brussels from Rome, or would plan to leave Rome slightly earlier than the Prime Minister.

This has implications for the timing of her flight. As I understand it, present plans are for the Prime Minister to leave the Residence in time to be at the Chancellor's bungalow at 1945. You may like to check this point with Mr Eastwood in Bonn in order to decide on the timing of flights.





- I spoke to Sir Mark Heath this morning. He felt that we already have sufficient input from him. In particular, he drew my attention to some of the additional briefs supplied by him at the time of the State Visit and of the views expressed by the PUS, which he shares.
- 2. He said that the most delicate and difficult matter for decision before the Prime Minister's visit was whether or not she should be advised to let the Pope know that we are considering changing the status of our relations with the Holy See.

- 4. Sir Mark Heath also asked for instructions fairly soon on what part he was to play in the Prime Minister's visit. Should he accompany the Prime Minister at her audience with the Pope? Or at least accompany her to and from the Vatican? Or offer some hospitality?

We should like the Embassy in Rome to prompt the Italians to firm up the arrangements for the Prime Minister's visit to Rome on 23/24 November. Could you let us know the Prime Minister's preferences on two points?

Sir Ronald Arculus plans to give a dinner for the Prime Minister on the evening of her arrival, Sunday 23 November. Would the Prime Minister prefer a quiet 'in house' dinner; a small dinner to which only Signor Forlani and Signor Colombo, the Foreign Minister, would be invited; or perhaps a larger dinner including, for example, other Italian Ministers and/or industrialists? The second might be best, since Signor Forlani and Signor Colombo might speak more frankly in a relaxed atmosphere, though the Embassy are not certain that Italian Ministers would be available on the Sunday evening.

Should Lord Carrington be present at the Prime Minister's tete-a-tete with the Italian Prime Minister? Would she prefer it to be on the Sunday evening (if possible) or on the Monday morning? One possibility might be for Lord Carrington to have a separate discussion with Signor Colombo for, say, 20 minutes or so and then for the two Foreign Ministers to join the Prime Ministers.

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

ANNEX C

INSTRUCTIONS ABOUT FORMAT

All briefs should be laid out in the same way with a top page in accordance with the specimen layout at Annex D. Those preparing briefs should pay particular attention to ensuring that the following instructions are fully observed:

Content

- a. Briefs should be concise. Each brief should if possible be no more than four sides long.
- b. The mair body of each brief should comprise two sections, a concise list of Points to Make, followed by a factual Background section which distinguishes clearly between information which can be freely used and information which should not be disclosed.
- c. Briefs should be complete and self-contained with all the information required on that particular subject. Briefs should not be divided into separate sulf-contained sub-sections.

Layout

- d. Briefs should be typed in double spacing, using both sides of the paper. Pages should be numbered at the foot of each page.
- e. As shown in the specimen at Annex D, the top page only of each brief should contain the following details: the symbol and number of the brief in the top left-hand corner (eg PMVD(80) 7) with the date of production below; a copy number in red at the top right-hand corner; the visit heading; the title of the brief (in capitals) and the name of the Department responsible.
- f. At the foot of the last page and on the left-hand side, briefs should bear the name of the originating Government Department and the date of origin.

Reproduction

g. Briefs should be reproduced throughout on white paper, with each page bearing a security classification at top and bottom (as in Annex D). Care should be taken that the reproduction method employed results in clear readable copies. h. It is important that on arrival at the Cabinet Office, briefs should be complete in all detail - collated, stapled and copy numbered - and ready for immediate circulation.

Updating

- i. If late developments require a brief to be amended or updated, an addendum snould be prepared. It should be set out in the form described at e. above, with the brief number (eg PMVD(80) 10 Addendum) and title to which it relates at the top of the front page. The Privace Secretary to the Secretary of the Cabinet should be informed when an addendum is in preparation. Revised briefs and corrigenda should be similarly treated.



ANGLO-ITALIAN CONSULTATIONS, ROME, 23-24 NOVEMBER

- 1. As you know, it had been agreed before the fall of the Cossiga Government that the Prime Minister would visit Rome for the next in the series of bi-annual Anglo-Italian Consultations on 23-24 November. Our present expectation is that an Italian Government of some kind will be formed before 23 November and that the Summit will go ahead as planned.
- 2. Assuming the Summit takes place on the dates agreed, our main aim at the meeting will be to establish good working relations with the new Italian Prime Minister (Signor Cossiga is almost certainly going to step down), in particular by showing that we take seriously Italian views on major current international issues. It will be timely to discuss issues of current importance in the Community, particularly those likely to come up at the European Council in December, and we shall want to explore Italian thinking on restructuring with a view to establishing closer cooperation. Our assessment of UK and probable Italian objectives is set out in Annexes A and B.
- 3. The Prime Minister plans to arrive in Rome on the evening of Sunday, 23 November in time for dinner and to leave in the late afternoon of the following day. Although Italian officials are as yet unable to offer any advice on the programme it seems probable that there will be a tete-a-tete with the Italian Prime Minister on the Sunday evening, a plenary session on the Monday morning, a lunch given by the Italian Prime Minister and a joint press conference.



4. The Italians have not yet proposed an agenda, but it seems likely to include: the outcome of the United States Presidential election and the new United States Government's policies, particularly as they may affect East/West relations; developments in the Middle East, both over Arab/Israel and the Gulf; and Western policy towards the developing world, on which the Italians may press for a more forthcoming Western approach. Buropean Community enlargement and restructuring will be much in their minds but they are likely to want to elicit British thinking rather than to put forward precise ideas of their own. We therefore envisage that the main subjects for discussion will be:

- (a) outcome of the United States Presidential election, and its implications
- (b) East-West Relations
- (c) Afghanistan
- (d) Middle East (including Iran/Iraq)
- (e) European Community Questions
- (f) Defence and Disarmament Questions
- (g) The International Economic Scene
- (h) Energy Questions
- (i) Bilateral Questions (including cooperation in combating terrorism).
- 5. I assume that, as when she last visited Rome, the Prime Minister will not wish on this occasion to be accompanied by any of her Ministerial colleagues, apart from the Foreign and Commonwealth Secretary. She may wish to delay a decision on participation by officials until the Italians have been able to tellous their own proposals for participation and agenda.
- I attach at Annex C a suggested list of briefs, the preparation of which I suggest should be coordinated by the Cabinet Office in the usual way.





ANGLO ITALIAN CONSULTATIONS: ROME, 23 - 24 NOVEMBER

- You will have seen from Rome telegram number 568 that the Italian Foreign Minister made an approach to Lord Carrington, in the margins of the State Visit to Italy, expressing in unusually high-key terms Italian opposition to quadripartite consultations.
- Although this is a long-standing Italian preoccupation the terms of this approach suggest to us that it would be advisable to have a separate defensive note prepared for the Prime Minister's use at the Anglo-Italian consultations, rather than covering the issues in general terms in the Steering Brief as we have done on previous occasions. One possible way of incorporating this in the briefing would be to divide Brief No 11 ''Bilateral Questions'' into Section (a) ''Terrorism'' and Section (b) ''Consultations''. If you agree with this suggestion you may wish, in putting the proposed list of briefs to the Prime Minister's Private Secretary, to indicate the Brief 11(b) would be a defensive note on the Italian attitude to quadripartite consultations. We would then ensure that the brief had a suitably restricted circulation.

Prime Minister's Visit to Italy

Would you please refer to paragraph 2(b) of Michael Alexander's letter of 25 July about the Prime Minister's visit to Rome on 23-24 November during which Mrs Thatcher has said she would like to call on the Pope.

The Pope will be in Rome at that time. Owing to the brevity of Mrs Thatcher's visit, however, we propose that she should pay a private, rather than an official, call on the Pope. Such a call would, we consider, make the best use of the available time in that formalities would be kept to a minimum. There would be no presentation of suites nor obligatory separate call on the Cardinal Secretary of State followed by his return call, although Cardinal Casaroli could be included in the private visit if desired.

Furthermore, to fit in with the programme of Anglo-Italian talks, the call will have to take place during the afternoon of 24 November. Since Papal audiences are usually only arranged in the morning, the Vatican have indicated that the Pope is more likely to agree a call during the afternoon if it is a private rather than official one. In view of these considerations I hope that you can agree that we should seek a private call on the Pope.



- 2. Plans are now in train, as you know, for the next meeting of the two Prime Ministers in November. Do you think it would be helpful if I were to offer Gardini half a day or a day of talks here between now and then? You know my view of his chairmanship, and I am not sure how much influence he has on Italian foreign policy, but the things that he says are often of interest if one can only manage to grasp what he is driving at. I would gladly fit in some talks if you thought it would be helpful: I could for example invite him here on his way to one of the meetings of the Political Committee in Iuxumbourg or on his way back. Perhaps you could let me know what you think.

Mr Alexander's letter to Mr Lever of 25 July said that the Prime Minister had agreed that we should propose to the Italian Government a visit on 23-24 November. The dates chosen overlap with the dates now announced for The Queen's Visit to Belgium (24-25 November). If you consider that the Secretary of State would wish to accompany The Queen to Belgium you may like to sound out No 10 informally about proposing to the Italian Government a visit later in that week. We are not, for the time being, taking any action with the Italians until this question is decided.

2. If, on the other hand, the Secretary of State does not consider it necessary for him to accompany The Queen on what would be largely formal visits to Belgium, the European Commission and NATO you may wish to suggest that another FCO Minister should go in his place (I understand that the Lord Privy Seal expects to be in Africa that week) I have consulted ECD(I) and Defence Department who would not see objection to this although both departments would see some advantage in the Anglo-Italian Consultation dates being changed in a way which would allow Lord Carrington to participate in both events.

Anglo-Italian Consultations

It was agreed last October that Anglo-Italian Consultations should be held at Head of Government level twice a year. The last in the series took place in January when the Italian Prime Minister visited London. The timing of the next meeting was discussed in the margins of the Venice Summit. The Diplomatic Adviser to Signor Cossiga has now told Sir Ronald Arculus that Signor Cossiga is looking forward to seeing Mrs Thatcher and Lord Carrington again in Rome and has asked whether dates might be found in late November.

Lord Carrington would see advantage in a visit by the Prime Minister to Rome at the time proposed. It is important that we continue to take full advantage of the Italian wish to maintain a tactical alliance with us on Community questions. The suggested timing would be shortly before the next European Council Meeting (1-2 December) and well after the State Visit to Italy (14-17 October) which will also provide an opportunity for Lord Carrington to have consultations with the Italian Foreign Minister. However, you will wish to take account of the timing of the Anglo-German Summit about which I have written to you separately. Subject to that we propose that Mrs Thatcher might consider paying a two-day visit to Rome during the week beginning 24 November.

A visit to Rome would also provide a suitable occasion $\dot{}$ for a meeting with the Pope, if the Prime Minister so wished.

Our Embassy would like, if possible, to put suggested dates to Signor Cossiga's office before the end of this month.
